That it is far from being complete and contains many errors is well known to the writer.

Many known words, especially in the department of Natural History, have been omitted for want of sufficient knowledge concerning the objects to accurately define them.

To attain a correct knowledge of all the varied pronunciations and uses of some words in the different sections of the Mende country, will require a more extended investigation than the writer has yet been able to make.

The vocabulary is issued in this form as a beginning, from which it is hoped great advances will in future be made and at the same time it is believed, that it will greatly aid those needing such a helper.

May God bless this effort for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.


