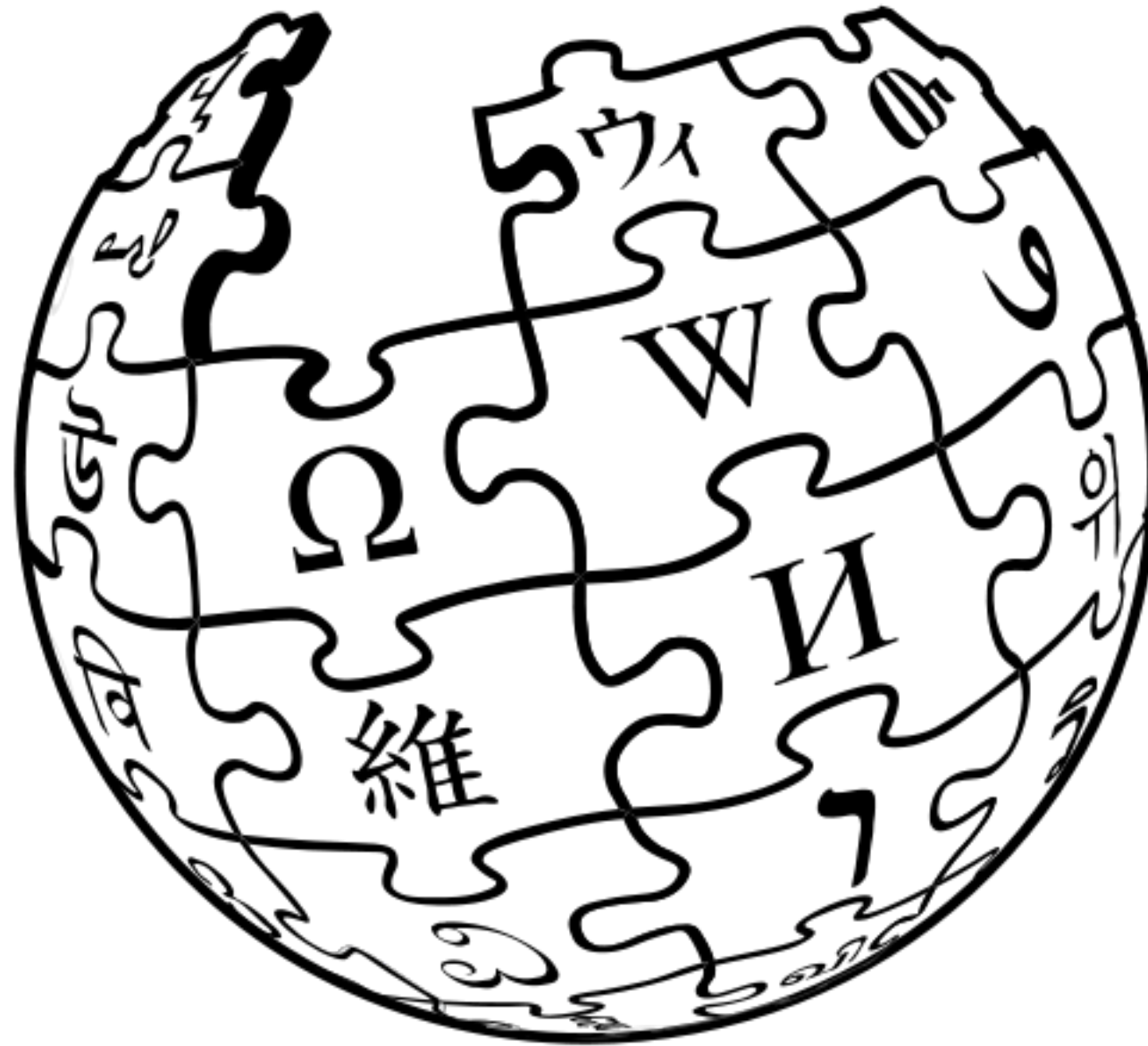


Why do people edit Wikipedia?

We reviewed all peer reviewed papers we could find on this topic, published from 2005-2011, and found no clear answers.

[[Wikipedia:Wikipedians]] and [[Community of Wikipedia]] basically just recap those papers.

So, in a word: **no**.

Interview Round 1

- 23 interviews with very active and experienced Wikipedians
- Collected by the Wikimedia Storytellers as part of the annual fundraiser

Interview Round 2

- 11 interviews with English Wikipedians who had just made their 1,000th edit
- Collected by Maryana Pinchuk as part of an experiment in thanking new contributors

How we studied this

A mixed method analysis:

First, qualitative coding of interviews by multiple people, looking for statements about motivation.

Next, rough quantitative measurement of code data.

Autonomy

“ It's good to be allowed to do what you like. ”

“ I think it's really beautiful that people can do what they want (within reason, of course). ”

The core mission

“ I prefer that knowledge should be available to all, knowledge should not be restricted, knowledge should be free for all. ”

Topical interest

“ It was a pleasure because I was learning new things about the area I like. ”

Audience

“ It makes me feel like my edits might actually be used by somebody. ”

“ I don't know what I could do that could have that much popularity, that could have that many people reading my writing. ”

Perfectionism

“ I think it can never be too good. ”

“ I just feel like I kind of have to. Like, when I see an article that, let's say the grammar or the vocabulary or spelling are written rather poorly, I have to correct it somehow, or any spelling errors, I have to correct them. ”

Challenge

“ I just went and put my head down
and just figured it out for myself ”

“ I do it because it's almost like mountain climbing
for me, it's the challenge. I do it because it's there. ”

Self-expression

“ this is my voice ”

“ I find it to be a great outlet personally ”

Responsibility

“ I have to play my part in keeping the Wikipedia pages from being abused. ”

Addiction

“ I just got hooked. ”

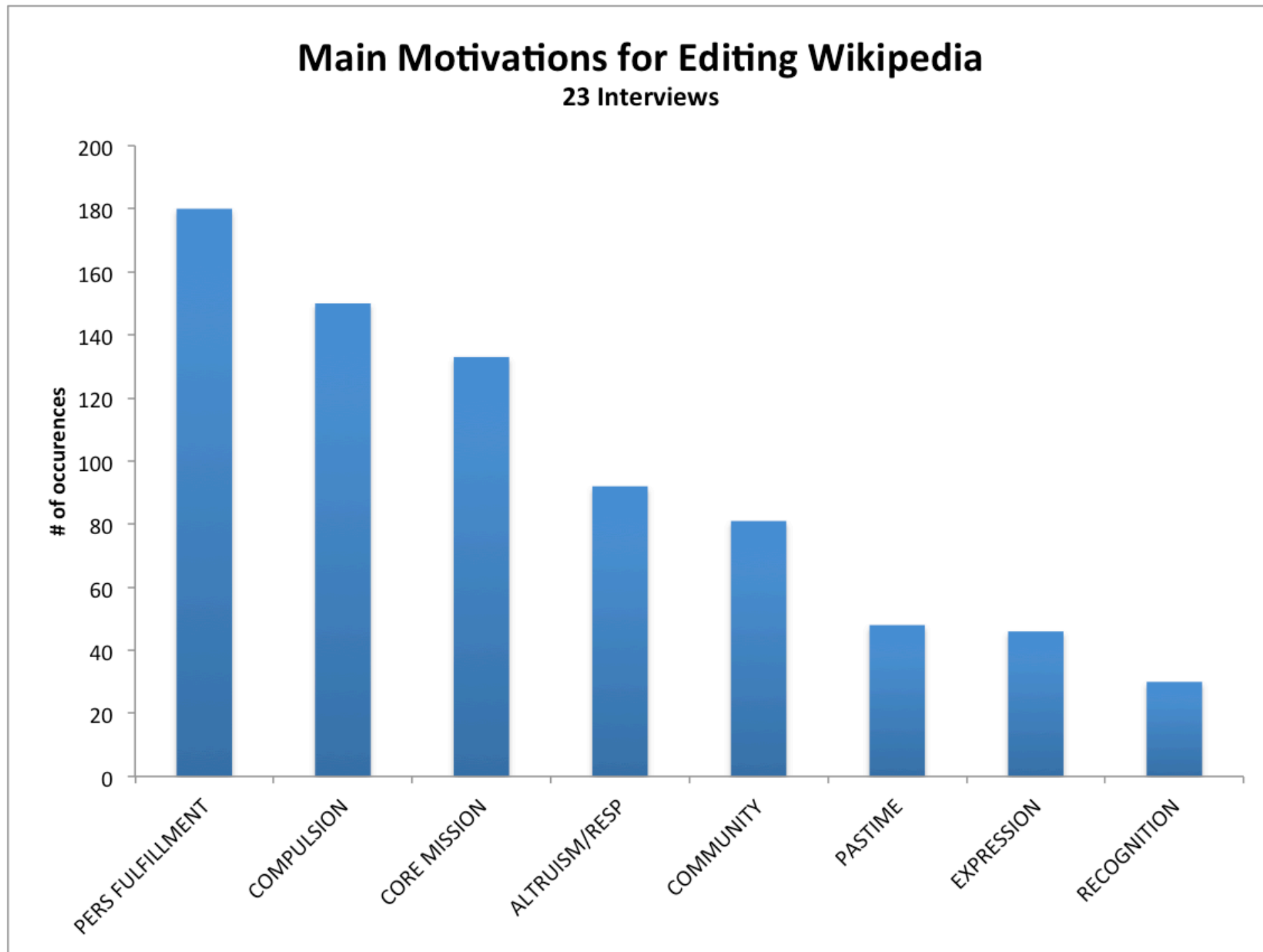
“ I keep telling myself I’ll cut back. ”

Recognition

“ It's nice to be appreciated. ”

“ My favorite part about Wikipedia is the constructive attitude. When you make a mistake, people tell you how to fix it. And when you do a good job, you're praised. ”
