## WILLIAMSON SISTERS CONFIRM COLLEGE CHOICE OF PARENTS & GRANDFATHER

Thirty-seven current Bryan students are second generation students who have one or both parents on the alumni rolls of Bryan. Of these, two are also third generation students by virtue of having a grandfather who is a Bryan graduate. These sisters, Naomi and Cindy, who were also students last year, are the daughters of Richard '60 and Faith (Allem) '70 Williamson and granddaughters of Dr. Warren Allem '57.

Since Naomi will be leaving Bryan this year as the first third generation graduate to have both parents and one grandparent who are graduates, we have recorded an interview with Naomi and Cindy to share with alumni.

In passing it should be noted that two earlier graduates have associations which give them third generation claim in a more limited relationship. David Honeywell '59 of Three Rivers, Michigan, was preceded at Bryan by his mother Joy Bedford Honeywell x'35, and his grandmother, Mabel Bedford x'34, who were both students at the same time in the early 30s, but neither of them graduated. Another third generation representative is Harold Morgan, Jr. '67, whose mother, Katherine (Arnold) Morgan '61, and his grandmother, Bertha Morgan '34 were both graduates.

From this year's third generation graduate and her sister we share the following interview:

How did you feel, Naomi, about attending a college that your parents had attended before you?

Naomi: At first I didn't want to come. At my freshman college year, my parents said, "Please go to Bryan." But I said, "No, I just don't want to go." My concept of a Christian was a lot different then than it is now. So I went to a secular college my freshman year. That's when I really found the Lord personally. I had been saved when I was six, but I really met the Lord then at college. He said, "Go to Bryan," and so I came. It was a blessing to find the fellowship that was here, and now I really love Bryan. I realize my parents were right all along about my coming here.

Well, Cindy, what did you think about coming to Bryan where your parents attended and your sister was still here?

Cindy: I didn't think about any other college. I always thought about coming here when I was in high school. Then when Naomi came and told me more about it, that made me want to come even more. So Bryan was the only school I even considered.

Can you remember any stories that your Mom and Dad told you about their experiences in college?

Cindy: One time Mom and Dad said they got campused because they had their ankles crossed when they were dating on a picnic. They couldn't talk together for a whole week, and they often kid about that.

Naomi: I remember that they said you had to have lights out by eleven o'clock, and then Daddy told us he was on the cross country team.

Now that you are about to graduate, Naomi, what do you have in mind for the future?

Naomi: Well, it is exciting in a way, just to see what the Lord has planned. After I graduate I plan to go to Japan as a summer missionary and possibly I could stay for a year. Then I plan to come back and try to raise

some money to pay up the loans that I have had to come to Bryan. Then possibly I will go on for my master's in either social work or child psychology—probably social work. Then I could go back to the mission field or whatever the Lord has in mind. It's really unclear right now; but this is a general plan that the Lord showed me at Urbana, which has helped to keep me stable.

Tell us more about your recent experience at Urbana. Naomi: Well, it was just a blessing. I rode 24 hours in a Teen Missions bus with a load of people to the conference. I think that just being at Urbana showed me that I want to stay in God's work and possibly in missions. I am ready to do that, if it is what the Lord wants.

Cindy, have you made any plans about your future? Cindy: Yes, I am majoring in elementary education and plan to teach.

What grade do you think you would like to teach? Cindy: Third grade.

What is your favorite subject to teach?

Cindy: Social studies and English, but in elementary school I like all the subjects. When it gets to college level, that's different.

What about your brothers, do you think they might attend Bryan?

Naomi: I really wish Mike would. He is a junior now at Georgia Southwestern. He's playing baseball there and he is pretty set with that. And Steve, our younger brother, is planning to go to Naval Academy.

Do you think of anything else that you would like to share in connection with your associations at Bryan?

Naomi: If someone were to ask me what I have learned or gained the most out of being at Bryan, I would say it is the fellowship that has taught me about loving one another with a sincere heart and fervently praying for and encouraging one another. Here you see the Bible acted out in every day life. In the world when

you do favors for people, they don't seem to appreciate it at times. But here you get a sense of what true Christian love and fellowship really is, so that when I leave I will better understand how life should be. I have a high regard for Bryan because it has taught me who God is and how to honor Him the most.

Do you have anything to add, Cindy?

Cindy: It is like Naomi said, that the fellowship here with friends is very special and the teachers really care about me as an individual. You can tell when they care by the way they talk to you and speak to you individually. I really appreciate that. It makes you feel that the subject is more interesting when they really care about you.

Naomi: You asked earlier whether my parents forced me to come. I think that is the whole key in my opinion, because when I was ready to come, I could readily accept everything. I think that is the problem with so many Christian parents when they say to a son or daughter that he or she must go to a Christian school or they won't pay the tuition. Then the child becomes rebellious because they wanted to go somewhere else. That might have happened to me my freshman year when I preferred to go to a secular school. I realize now I wasn't ready for Bryan, but after going to a secular school, then coming to Bryan was God's timing for me.

Do you have any comments about your grandfather Allem who attended Bryan and was also a staff member?

Naomi: We really haven't seen our grandparents very many times. We visit them occasionally, but we haven't gotten to know them very well. I just learned this summer that my grandfather was on the public relations staff.

Thanks so much, Naomi and Cindy, for sharing your candid thoughts and opinions about being second and even third generation students at Bryan. I hope, Naomi, that your parents and your grandparents can all be present when you graduate on May 8 this spring.

## **ALUMNI ENTERTAIN SENIORS**






DAN x'63 and SHELBY (SKINNER) '61 HARRI-SON ended the year 1981 at the Urbana Missions Conference as representatives of Wycliffe Bible Translators. Dan is Vice President for Development and North American Area Director for Wycliffe with Shelby as his assistant at the international office in Dallas, Texas. During the year Dan traveled with a companion to minister in Japan, Taiwan, the Philippines, and Singapore. In Japan Wycliffe has 20 missionaries and they hope to see 100 Japanese involved. 


