# *IN MEMORIAM*

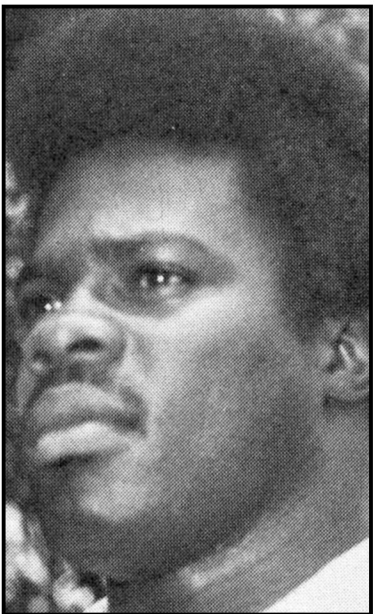

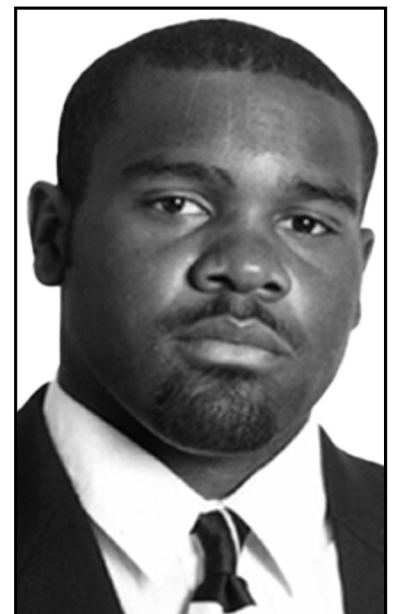

#### AT THE GAMES...

Credentials are necessary for admittance to the Turpin Stadium press box and field house. Credentials also grant the bearer a meal in the press box, served well before kickoff. All requests for credentials (press or sideline) should be made to SID Jason Pugh, by fax (318-357-4515) or e-mail (pughj@nsula.edu). Credentials will be mailed if time permits. If not, credentials will be available in the Sports Information office on Fridays before home games, at the campus police station on game day or at the Will Call window in the southwest corner of Turpin Stadium's press box side on game day.

Photo deck space is limited. Northwestern's game taping crew has priority on the sixth level deck. There are two film decks on the fifth level, available on a first-come first-serve basis. Access to the top of the press box is available. There is usually space in the stands immediately below the press box. In the event of a televised game, the originating TV crew has priority.

Sideline passes are available on a limited basis. Use is restricted to outside the team areas on each sideline. Sideline credentials are good for press box admittance.

Parking passes are available on a limited basis. Press parking is on the press box side of the stadium, northwest of the press box. Again, make requests by email prior to game day.

Press box services include the pregame meal served an hour before kickoff. Soft drinks and snacks are available throughout the game. Internet access is available by ethernet or wireless. Quarterly, halftime and final statistics will be distributed along with play-by-play sheets. A pregame packet with a program, flip card, fact sheets, and updated notes will be available in the press area.

To ensure equal access for all media, the Demon locker room will be closed. Postgame interviews with NSU players and coaches for home night games are conducted on the field near the south end zone adjacent to the Clayton Plaza shortly after play ends. The Turpin Stadium elevator will be reserved for media use with 4 minutes left to play. Selected players and head coach Brad Laird will be available for postgame interviews. Laird and players will also be interviewed on the Demon Sports Network and that can be heard in the Turpin Stadium press box.

#### DURING THE WEEK...

Player interviews must be set up through SID Jason Pugh at least one day in advance to minimize demands on the student-athlete's busy schedule. Brief face-to-face post-practice interviews may be conducted if time permits.

# BRAD LAIRD

HEAD COACH · SIXTH SEASON AS NSU HEAD COACH

Entering his sixth season as the head coach at his alma mater, **Brad Laird** has the Northwestern State eyeing the continued improvement his team shown in Year Five of his tenure.

In Laird's fifth season, his Demons finished 4-2 in Southland Conference play, recording the program's first winning season in conference play since 2010, and played for at least a share of the conference title in the final two weeks of the season.

Included in the conference schedule was Northwestern State's first 4-0 start in Southland play since a perfect 6-0 league campaign in 1988. The four wins also pushed the Demons' Southland win streak to five games dating to a win at McNeese in the 2021 season finale — the longest conference win streak since NSU won eight straight games across the 1997 and 1998 seasons.

The first four seasons of Laird's tenure as the head coach at his alma mater produced record-setting offenses, turnover-happy defenses and arguably the most challenging set of circumstances faced by a Northwestern State football team that led to an abbreviated five-game schedule in the spring of 2021.

Laird's head coaching career also has seen the end of a pair of long streaks against longtime rival McNeese. Northwestern State's 24-20 win in the 2021 season finale at Cowboy Stadium gave the Demons their first win in Lake Charles since 1988.

Three years earlier, Northwestern State snapped a 13-game overall losing streak to McNeese with a thrilling 37-34 overtime win in Turpin Stadium.

In Laird's first three seasons, the Demon offense rewrote the school passing record book, including seeing Shelton Epler overwrite Laird's career passing yardage mark of 6,037 yards which stood since 1995.

Despite playing just six games during the 2021 spring season, the Demons saw quarterback Bryce Rivers become the first Demon to surpass 400 yards passing in a game more than once, doing so in each of the final two games.

Individual honors have found their way to Natchitoches as NSU has produced three All-Americans, a pair of HERO Sports Sophomore All-Americans and two Freshman All-Americans under Laird.

Away from the field, offensive lineman Chris Zirkle was a Campbell Trophy semifinalist, a nominee for the American Football Coaches Association Allstate Good Works Team and a semifinalist for the Doris Robinson Award in 2019.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, wide receiver Gavin Landry was a two-time Campbell Trophy semifinalist, earning the distinction in 2020 and 2021.

Laird's first Northwestern State team in 2018 posted a one-win improvement from the 2017 season, but the feel around the program was one of effective nostalgia.

There was a record-setting offense that would have made Laird the quarterback smile. Making Laird equally happy were the strides the NSU defense made in his first season as the head coach.

A three-time defensive coordinator for a total of eight seasons at Northwestern State, Laird saw the Purple Swarm regain that moniker in 2018,

collecting 32 sacks (its highest total since 2002) and forcing 26 turnovers. The Demons forced another 24 turnovers in 2019. Counting the 2017 season when Laird was the defensive coordinator, the Demons enter 2020 having forced 67 turnovers in their past 34 games.

From 2013-16, Laird was in charge at his high school alma mater, Ruston, where he averaged more than seven wins in four playoff seasons as head coach.

In 2017, Laird restored the "Purple Swarm" brand for the NSU defense, which had struggled in the past two seasons but showed flashes of brilliance, especially down the stretch. In the final month of the season, the Demons twice recorded 13 tackles for loss in wins over Houston Baptist and Abilene Christian, and staged a series of goal-line stands, two in the season-ending victory over Stephen F. Austin.

Linebacker Peyton Guidry was named the national FCS Defensive Player of the Week after making 18 tackles against the Lumberjacks.

Laird was running the Purple Swarm defense when NSU was second nationally in total defense (2004, 274.7 yards allowed per game) and ninth (2003, 287.3 ypg) and produced 75 turnovers from 2003-05. The Demons set three NCAA records and led the Southland Conference in total defense and rushing defense, also ranking highly in pass defense each season. The Demons won their most recent Southland championship and made their last FCS playoff appearance in 2004.

In 2004, the Demons tied an NCAA FCS record by notching two safeties vs. Texas Southern. A year earlier, his defense set FCS records by allowing only 1 first down and a net of minus 1-yard offense to Oklahoma Panhandle.

After a record-setting playing career at NSU, Laird joined coach Sam Goodwin's Demon staff in 1996, serving as the defensive graduate assistant coach working for then Demon defensive coordinator Peveto. He then worked for coach Don Shows at West Monroe High School in 1997, going on to coach at Ouachita High, Longview (Texas) High (under former FCS national champion coach Pat Collins) and Nashville (Ark.) High (under his father, Billy Laird) before joining Stoker's staff as defensive coordinator prior to spring practice in 2003 (Collins and Shows are in the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame).

From 2005-06, Laird served as the director of Northwestern State's alumni office.

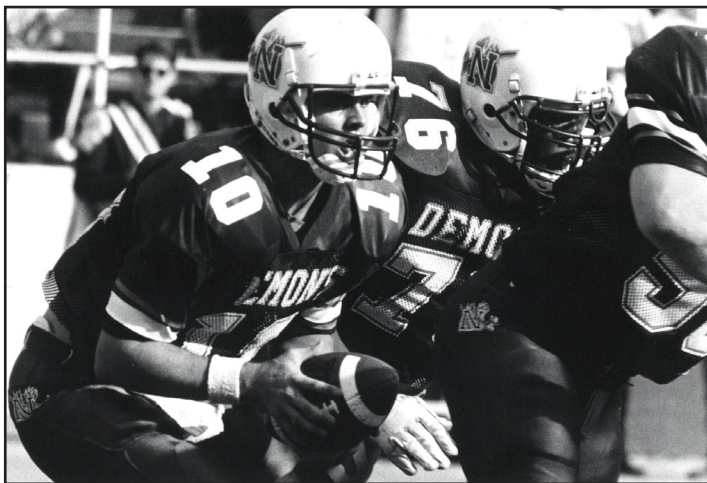
The Demons' former all-time career passing leader (6,037 yards, 1991-95), he was a 2015 inductee in the N-Club Hall of Fame, the university's highest athletic honor.

An all-state quarterback in the state's largest classification at Ruston, Laird was the 1990 Superdome Classic MVP for the Bearcats' unbeaten team that finished ranked No. 1 nationally by USA Today. He was inducted in the Louisiana High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2010.

Brad and his wife, Renee, are both Northwestern State graduates and the parents of Brianna (20) and Brock (16).

After a whirlwind first year on Northwestern State's staff, **Beau Blair** enters his second season with the Demons with a chance to leave his imprint on the NSU offense.

Blair came to Natchitoches as an offensive line coach but was thrust into the offensive coordinator's role less than two weeks ahead of NSU's 2022 season opener at Montana.

Despite the upheaval, Blair made a smooth transition to his new post, helping build an NSU offense that produced the Southland Conference Newcomer of the Year (wide receiver Zach Patterson) and the first NSU quarterback to throw for 300 or more yards in five straight games.

Under Blair, NSU ranked 18th nationally in passing yards per game (268.9) and gave up the fewest sacks in the Southland (five, down 17 from 2021). The Demons saw a five-point per game increase in Southland play from the previous season and gained 60 more yards per conference game.

Blair's first Demon offense also featured four all-conference performers — first-team tight end Travon Jones and second teamers Zachary Clement (quarterback), Patterson and Javon Antonio (wide receiver).

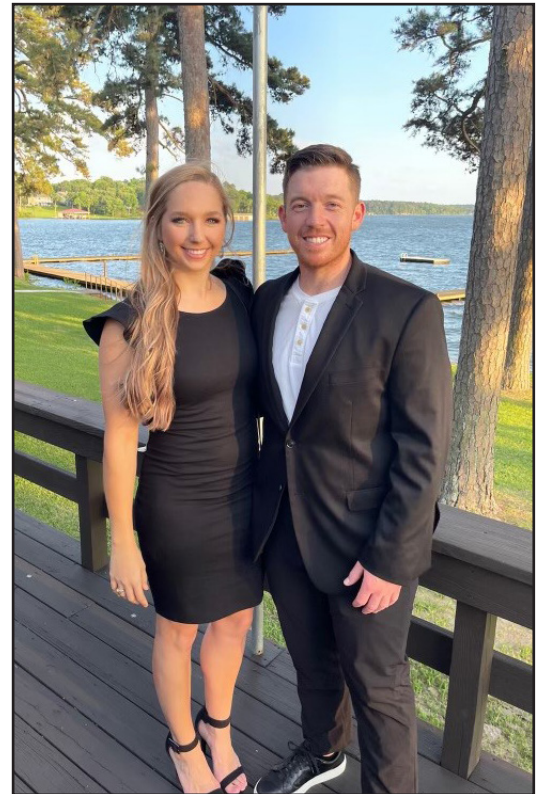
Blair came to Natchitoches after spending the 2021 season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at New Mexico Highlands.

In his lone season there, Blair coordinated an offense that produced five all-conference players, including the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year — wide receiver CJ Sims. Under Blair, the Cowboys offense led the RMAC in passing offense and was second in total offense, producing a top-25 season nationally.

Prior to his time at New Mexico Highlands, Blair spent two seasons as an offensive line coach at Incarnate Word. Blair helped mold a Cardinals offensive line into a unit that blocked for a top-20 FCS passing offense while helping UIW average 5.1 yards per carry and record a single-game school record 402 yards rushing.

Blair was a graduate assistant offensive line coach at Houston in 2018, helping the Cougars rank fourth nationally in scoring offense (46.4 ppg) and sixth in total offense (538.6 yards per game) despite ranking 128th of 130 teams in time of possession.

A Gilmer, Texas, native, Blair began his collegiate coaching career at Southeastern University in Lakeland,

Florida, coaching tight ends and assisting with the offensive line. The Fire was the No. 1 NAIA scoring offense in 2017 and No. 2 in total offense while producing an all-conference tight end.

Blair spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Jacksonville (Texas) High School where he also was the strength and conditioning coordinator and head powerlifting coach. With Blair on staff, Jacksonville broke an eight-year playoff drought and produced a quarterback who rushed for 2,150 yards. Blair also coached one offensive lineman who continued his career in college.

Blair began his coaching career at Diboll (Texas) High School as the offensive line coach and strength and conditioning coordinator, helping Diboll improve from a 1-9 mark to 5-5 in his lone season.

A 2014 graduate of Stephen F. Austin in liberal studies, Blair also holds a master's degree in human performance and sport from New Mexico Highlands.

Blair and his fiancée, Lauren Twardowski, were engaged in June 2022.

In his first season at Northwestern State, defensive coordinator **Weston Glaser** made an immediate impact on the Purple Swarm in his return to the Southland Conference.

That first impression was strong enough for Glaser to add the responsibilities and title of assistant head coach for the 2023 season.

Glaser's first Northwestern State defense played a key role in helping the Demons craft the first 4-0 Southland start in 35 years and produced three all-conference performers — one of whom landed an NFL contract.

Cornerback William Hooper earned second-team All-Southland honors and signed an undrafted free agent contract with the NFL.

Joining Hooper in Glaser's all-conference haul were second-team selections defensive lineman Jomard Valsin Jr. and PJ Herrington, who made the all-conference team as both a safety and as a punt returner.

Glaser came to Natchitoches after a four-season run at Campbell in which he was both the Camels' defensive coordinator and, in 2021, their assistant head coach.

A member of the 2019 American Football Coaches Association's 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership institute, Glaser coordinated a Camel defense that was the No. 2-ranked pass defense in its abbreviated four-game 2020 season. That season, Campbell faced four Football Bowl Subdivision teams — Georgia Southern, Coastal Carolina, Appalachian State and Wake Forest — and surrendered 185.2 passing yards per game.

During his Campbell tenure, Glaser's defenses twice led the Big South in pass defense and helped the program post a 6-5 mark in 2019, marking the second of back-to-back winning seasons which had not been done at Campbell in the school's modern era (dating to 2008).

As the interim defensive coordinator for the final three games of 2018, Glaser's defense led FCS in fewest passing yards allowed (122.5) and ranked seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense (103.27). Included in that stretch was a single-game school record for fewest passing yards allowed as Campbell held Presbyterian to 12 yards in a 34-6 Camels' win.

Campbell defensive lineman Brevin Allen was

named the 2021 Big South Defensive Player of the Year under Glaser's tutelage, giving Glaser nine all-conference and two all-American selections since the 2019 season.

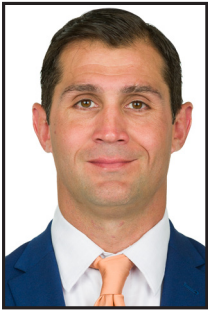
A former Sam Houston quarterback, Glaser began his coaching career at his alma mater, spending three seasons (2010-12) on the Bearkat staff, helping Sam Houston post a 31-10 record, capture two Southland Conference titles and reach consecutive FCS National Championship Games.

The Waco, Texas, native worked with UTEP's linebackers and defensive backs from 2013-15 and served as an assistant pit crew coach for Hendrick Sports' NASCAR Sprint Cup Series teams, driven by Jimmie Johnson and Dale Earnhardt Jr. from August 2014-January 2015. During his time with Hendrick Motorsports, Glaser also worked for the Cleveland Browns scouting department.

Glaser continued his coaching career at Texas A&M in 2016 working with the defensive backs and spent the spring of 2018 as the defensive coordinator at Howard Payne University before moving to Campbell.

Glaser and his wife, Laura, have two sons, Deacon and Brooks.

After nearly a decade out of the Southland Conference, **Jeremy Atwell** returned to the league when he was named Northwestern State's linebackers coach and special teams coordinator in February.

Atwell spent the 2022 season as the defensive coordinator at Albany State where he built a defense that led the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in pass efficiency defense and was second in the league in scoring defense in conference games, allowing just 7.4 points per game, and in third-down defense, allowing a 31.1-percent conversion rate. Under Atwell, the Rams were a top-10 unit nationally in scoring defense (14.9 points per game) and produced four All-SI-AC selections.

Prior to his one season at Albany State, Atwell was the defensive coordinator at New Mexico Highlands for two seasons.

Atwell's 2021 defense ranked third nationally in Division II in interceptions, leading the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. It also led the RMAC in total turnovers forced, ranking 11th nationally in that category as the Cowboys posted their most wins (6) since 2012. That defense, which ranked fourth in the RMAC in third-down defense, produced three All-RMAC selections.

Atwell's two seasons at New Mexico Highlands came after six years coaching at Louisiana high schools.

During the 2019 season, Atwell was the offensive coordinator and assistant head coach at Terrebonne High School, coordinating an offense that averaged 33.5 points per game and committed just five turnovers.

Atwell's Thibodaux team featured four FBS prospects — three of whom signed with Power Five programs.

Atwell spent five seasons as the head coach at Vandebilt Catholic High School in Houma, taking the Terriers to the state playoffs each season.

Prior to his high school excursion, Atwell spent nine seasons on staff at Nicholls as the Colonels' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. While with

Nicholls, Atwell produced a remarkable turnaround on defense — lifting the Colonels upward in five major statistical categories in two seasons.

Under Atwell's tutelage, the Colonels were the least-penalized defense in the Southland and ranked in the top four in third-down conversion percentage, pass defense and total defense while creating 22 total turnovers.

Atwell's time at Nicholls produced 21 All-Southland honorees, three All-Americans and a pair of NFL Draft picks — Lardarius Webb (Baltimore) and Kareem Moore (Washington).

From 2002-05, Atwell was the defensive coordinator and assistant head coach at Thibodaux High School, helping the Tigers break a 10-year playoff drought in 2003. In his four seasons on staff, Atwell helped Thibodaux post a 22-21 record while coaching 26 all-district and three all-state selections.

Atwell's college coaching career also included a season as the defensive ends coach at Nicholls (2001) and a year as an assistant defensive backs coach at Southeast Missouri State where Atwell was a two-year letterman who earned first-team All-Ohio Valley Conference honors as an inside linebacker.

A team captain, Atwell led the Redhawks in tackles, tackles for loss, fumble recoveries and forced fumbles. He was the runner up for the OVC Defensive Player of the Year honor after leading the conference in tackles for loss.

**Perry Carter** brings a long line of accolades to the Northwestern State coaching staff, joining the Demons as their cornerbacks coach ahead of the 2023 season.

Carter has spent nearly two decades coaching at the professional and college level, developing a number of award-winning defensive backs, including Pro Bowler Johnathan Joseph of the Houston Texans.

A four-year NFL veteran who played for Arizona, Kansas City and the then-Oakland Raiders as well as the Canadian Football League's Edmonton Elks, Montreal Alouettes and BC Lions, Carter is familiar with the state of Louisiana after spending the past five seasons coaching in the Pelican State.

The past two seasons saw Carter coach at Louisiana Tech as part of a staff that saw its pass defense improve within Conference USA while Baylen Buchanan became an honorable mention all-conference selection.

That improvement mirrored what Carter's defensive backs helped ULM achieve in his three seasons with the Warhawks. In that time, ULM's defense climbed from the bottom of the Sun Belt Conference to a No. 3 ranking in the conference.

Carter helped mold ULM's Corey Straughter into an All-American, a first-team All-Sun Belt selection and the nation's top passer rating allowed. Straughter also led the Sun Belt in pass breakups and interceptions.

Carter spent the 2017 season at Texas Tech where the Red Raiders led the Big 12 in takeaways and ranked in the top 10 nationally. Four Texas Tech defensive backs earned All-Big 12 honors that season.

Carter coached a season at St. Pius X High School, producing a defense that recorded 16 interceptions and topped 100 pass breakups. Three of his defensive backs were unanimous first-team all-district picks as St. Pius X had the No. 1 defense in Texas. In his lone season at St. Pius X, Carter led all his senior players to Division I scholarship offers.

During a two-season span at North Texas, Carter turned the Mean Green's safeties into a record-setting

group.

He coached the first pair of North Texas safeties to record at least 100 tackles in the same season while North Texas led C-USA in pass defense. Led by All-Conference USA freshman team selection Kishawn McClain, the UNT defense held three straight opponents under 100 yards passing.

Carter made his mark as a young coach with the NFL's Houston Texans, working as an assistant defensive back coach and working with the Houston special teams units.

With the Texans from 2006-13, Carter helped Houston's pass defense rank third in the NFL in the 2011 and 2013 seasons while helping Joseph earn a pair of Pro Bowl selections. In addition to Joseph, A.J. Bouye, Glover Quin and Kareem Jackson cut their teeth under Carter's direction.

Carter began his pro coaching career with the Hamburg Sea Devils of NFL Europe in 2006 where he coached Rayshaun Reed to all-league honors.

A Senior Bowl and All-American Bowl participant during his playing days at Southern Miss, Carter began his coaching career in 2004 at Texas A&M-Commerce, helping the Lions rank first in the Lone Star Conference in both pass defense and turnovers forced.

A McComb, Mississippi, native, Carter lettered three years at Southern Miss, recording 11 career interceptions – four of which he returned for touchdowns, establishing a school record. His three pick-sixes in 1992 are the school's single-season record.

A 1994 Southern Miss graduate in communications, Carter spent four seasons in both the NFL and CFL. He and his wife, Nicole, have two children – Bria and Perry Jr. Bria was a four-year track and field letterwinner at Houston while Perry Jr. plays wide receiver at Jacksonville State.

In January, **Chris Gistorb** landed his first full-time Division I coaching job, joining the Northwestern State staff as its defensive line coach.

Gistorb, a former UL Lafayette defensive lineman, brings more than a decade's worth of coaching experience in the talent-laden Houston area and spent the 2022 season on the staff of his alma mater as a defensive line quality control assistant.

While with the Ragin' Cajuns, Gistorb helped develop Zi'yon Hill-Green into a first-team All-Sun Belt Conference selection and was part of a team that reached the Independence Bowl, extending the Cajuns' bowl streak to six.

Ahead of returning to his alma mater, Gistorb was the co-defensive coordinator at Cy-Fair High School in the Houston suburb of Cypress. **Armani Lonardo** enters his first season on the Northwestern State staff armed with a history of helping build high-powered offenses.

While Lonardo will coach the Demon wide receivers, his work coaching multiple positions on an offense gives him unique insights into offensive coordinator Beau Blair's scheme.

Lonardo came to Northwestern State after spending the 2022 season as the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach and running backs coach at Southwestern Oklahoma State where he helped lead the Bulldogs from an 0-11 season to four wins.

Lonardo's offense ranked second in the Great American Conference with 247 passing yards per game and saw its scoring improve by 11 points per game. Quarterback Tylan Morton led the GAC with 287 yards of total offense per game and SWOSU produced a pair of all-conference receivers.

Lonardo spent the 2020 and 2021 seasons at New Mexico Highlands where he coached with current NSU offensive coordinator Beau Blair. With the Cowboys, Lonardo was the quarterbacks coach and tutored Ramone Atkins, a first-team All-RMAC selection, who accounted for 3,283 total yards in 2021.

The Cowboys' passing offense led the RMAC at 263.3 yards per game and 31 touchdowns and produced the RMAC Offensive Player of the Year, wide receiver CJ Sims.

Lonardo was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at ASA College New York in 2019, helping the Avengers rank third nationally in points per game (45.9), fourth in total offense (465 yards per game) and fifth in rushing yards (2,323). ASA finished 8-2 that season and had a win against No. 12 Monroe.

Lonardo has been a graduate assistant at both Tarleton and Southeastern University in Florida as well as a training camp assistant with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

He holds a bachelor's degree from Florida Atlantic (2015) and a master's degree from Tarleton (2018).

As a player, **Kyle Washington** knew about setting school records. In his first season at Northwestern State, he translated that knowledge to the field.

Washington joined the Northwestern State staff in January 2022 and saw his first Demon pupils produce one of the most proficient seasons in school history.

Under Washington's tutelage, Zachary Clement became the first Northwestern State quarterback to throw for at least 300 yards in five straight games, doing so from Sept. 24-Oct. 22.

That stretch helped the Demons rank 18th nationally in passing yards per game (268.9) — an increase of 56 yards per game from the 2021 season.

In each of his first two offseasons in Natchitoches, Washington has been part of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship program, working with the NFL's Los Angeles Rams in 2023 and the Indianapolis Colts in the summer of 2022.

Washington, a standout quarterback at Angelo State, comes to NSU after two seasons as the offensive coordinator at Franklin Pierce, a Division II school in New Hampshire.

With Washington on staff, the Ravens saw their offense enjoy an increase of 148 yards per game and an additional 115 rushing yards per game upon his arrival. While coaching quarterbacks and running backs in addition to his coordinator duties, Washington helped running back EJ Burgess rank fifth nationally in all-purpose yards per game (161.5) while earning All-Super Region One first-team acclaim and Northeast 10 Conference Offensive Player of the Year honors.

Washington's addition to the NSU staff means a return to the Southland Conference for Washington, who spent the 2019 season as an offensive quality control coach at McNeese, focusing on quarterbacks. While at McNeese, Washington oversaw video breakdowns of opposing defenses, conducted individual drills for Cowboy quarterbacks and implemented the

scheme for the scout team defense.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant working with running backs at Angelo State, his alma mater.

During his playing career at Angelo State, Washington was a semifinalist for the Harlan Hill Trophy — the Division II equivalent of the Heisman Trophy as a junior in 2014.

In his senior season, Washington quarterbacked a Rams offense that led Division II with an average of 560 yards per game, producing an average of 411 yards per game himself. He earned his second straight All-American nod from D2Football.com that season and repeated as the Lone Star Conference Offensive Player of the Year.

A three-time All-LSC honoree and three-time team captain, Washington helped lead Angelo State to a Lone Star Conference Playoff championship and a berth in the 2014 Division II national playoffs. He was the San Angelo Standard Times' Sportsman of the Year in 2014 and made the first of two appearances on the Don Hansen All-Super Region Four Team.

In 2013, his first year as a starter, Washington became the first ASU player to throw for more than 2,000 yards and rush for more than 1,000 yards in the same season.

His Angelo State career made him the Most Valuable Player on the Standard Times' All-Decade Team, selected in 2020.

Following his decorated college career, Washington participated in rookie minicamp with the Philadelphia Eagles and was a training camp participant with the Canadian Football League's Saskatchewan Roughriders.

Nationally recognized in his field, **Jason Smelser** was named Northwestern State's director of strength and conditioning in January.

Smelser comes to NSU from ULM where he spent the past year working primarily with the Warhawk baseball program as its head strength coach.

While at ULM, Smelser also assisted the head strength coach with ULM's football strength and conditioning program. While, At ULM served on a committee to revamp the athletic department to help produce a streamlined and better transparent way of operating, creating an internal and external operations system.

Prior to returning home to Louisiana, Smelser was the director of sports performance at William Jewell College in Liberty, Missouri. At William Jewell, Smelser oversaw and directed a staff that was responsible for implementing and designing strength and conditioning programs for 22 sports.

He also held a position on the athletic director's cabinet and designed and implemented mental health programs, better gameday experience with operations and create a better student experience for student-athletes.

His tenure at William Jewell came after spending the spring 2021 semester at Lane College as its director of sports performance. While working with 12 sports Smelser also made improvements to Lane's weight room and began implementing mental health programs for Lane's student-athletes.

Smelser spent seven years at Central Oklahoma as an assistant football coach and the head strength and conditioning coordinator for football and women's track and field. He instituted UCO's first nutrition program for its student-athletes and created a hired position for a nutritionist without institutional money.

While at Henderson State from 2011-14 as the head strength and conditioning coordinator, Smelser drew national acclaim as American Football Monthly Magazine's 2012 Division II Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year.

That recognition came for his work with the Reddies' football program, but Smelser also worked with men's and women's swimming and diving, women's volleyball and men's basketball at Henderson State.

A former head football coach and defensive coordinator at Iowa Wesleyan from 2005-10, Smelser was the defensive coordinator and head strength and conditioning coordinator at Concordia University in Ann Arbor, Michigan, for the 2010 season.

An all-state linebacker at Ouachita Christian near Monroe, Smelser is a two-time graduate of Southern Arkansas University, earning his undergraduate degree in kinesiology in 2000 and his master's in the same field in 2001.



## Dr. Tara TIETJEN-SMITH

Faculty Athletic Representative

1ST YEAR AT NSU

**Dr. Tara Tietjen-Smith** returned to her alma mater as the department head of the Department of Health and Human Performance ahead of the fall 2021 semester.

She was named Northwestern State's Faculty Athletic Representative after the conclusion of the 2022-23 academic year.

In her role as FAR, she serves as the liaison between the Northwestern State athletic department and the NSU faculty as well as the NCAA.

She is married to former Northwestern State pitcher Steve Smith, and the couple has two children — a daughter, Ayla, and a son, Bryce.



## Walker TORRAIN

Administrative Graduate Assistant • Offensive Line

1ST YEAR AT NSU

**Walker Torrain** is in his first season on the Northwestern State staff, working with the Demon offensive line.

Torrain comes to Natchitoches after two seasons at Kansas Wesleyan, having worked with both running backs and the defensive line.

In 2022, Torrain's running back group led the nation with 33 touchdowns and ranked fifth in rushing yards (2,413) and seventh in rush yards per game (219.4). Under Torrain's tutelage, the Coyotes saw an increase of 31 yards per game on the ground and had a pair of all-conference selections — first-teamer Nickolas Allsman and second-team pick Mark Benjamin.

In his first season at Kansas Wesleyan, Torrain helped the Coyote defense record 36 sacks — sixth nationally — and 86 tackles for loss. Those numbers marked an increase of 20 and 25, respectively, from the previous season.

Torrain helped coach three all-conference honorees in 2021, including honorable mention All-American Cole Parker, who was a unanimous first-team all-conference selection as Kansas Wesleyan went 10-1 and won its third conference title in four seasons.

A 2021 sports and leisure studies graduate of Midwestern State, Torrain spent four seasons on the Midwestern State staff as a student assistant, gaining experience in all facets of running a program.

He is pursuing a master's degree in health and human performance at Northwestern State.

Head Team Physician

2ND YEAR AT NSU

**Dr. William Zeichner**, a longstanding practicing physician in Natchitoches, is in his second year as Northwestern State's head team physician.

Zeichner began his surgical and family practice in Natchitoches in 1986 and has served the community in various roles, including an earlier stint as the Lady Demon soccer team's volunteer doctor from 2006-11.

Beginning with a historic meeting of five original institutions in Dallas on March 15, 1963, the Southland Conference set on an extraordinary course that has proven successful well into the 21st Century.

The members of the Southland Conference are Houston Christian University, the University of the Incarnate Word, Lamar University, McNeese State University, University of New Orleans, Nicholls State University, Northwestern State University, Southeastern Louisiana University, Texas A&M University-Commerce and Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. All told, the membership of the Southland encompasses over 140,000 current students and an alumni base of nearly 900,000.

Southland cities encompass approximately 14 million people, and its geography covers many of the nation's top 100 television markets, including Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston, San

Antonio, New Orleans, Shreveport and Baton Rouge. League institutions, their locations, and many of their namesakes are significant to the history of the South Central and Southwest regions of the United States.

Southland institutions are annually positioned among the nation's best public and private universities, exemplified by superb undergraduate and graduate education rankings, and featuring unique and accomplished curriculums at the bachelor's, master's and doctoral levels. Member universities are frequently acknowledged for their superior standing in areas such as college buy value and return on investment, student engagement, best-in-region status, favorable student-to-faculty ratios, service learning, military-friendly designations, honors programs, online learning, faith-based

learning, and access to higher education for all income levels.

Numerous Southland alumni have earned acclaim as business, medical, education and government leaders and innovators, iconic entertainers such as filmmakers, musicians and television/film actors, and athletes that starred at the professional and Olympic levels to earn hall of fame distinction.

Athletically, the Southland Conference sponsors championship play in 18 NCAA Division I sports at the NCAA Division I level. MISSOULA, Montana — After a slow start against No. 2 Montana, the Northwestern State football team found its footing midway through the first half of Saturday's season opener.

Then in a 109-second span near the end of the first half, the Grizzlies recaptured the momentum and re-established the tone in a 47-0 win for homestanding Montana at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

"When you play this type of football team in this type of atmosphere, you can't have the penalties we had, the turnovers we had, the field position we had, especially in the first half," fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. "They controlled it. We left a lot of things out there. Credit to them, but this game will not define our football team the rest of the season."

Montana (1-0) jumped to a 13-0 lead 12 minutes into the game on a pair of touchdown passes of 30 and 13 yards from Lucas Johnson to Mitch Roberts before the Purple Swarm defense began to slow the Grizzlies' attack. John Daigle's first career blocked kick kept it a 13-point game as the sophomore defensive end got a hand on Camden Capser's extra point try.

For much of the first quarter, the Demons (0-1) struggled to gain traction against the Montana defense, which ranked 24th nationally a season ago, allowing 330.7 yards per game. NSU put together its best drive of the half midway through the second quarter.

Highlighted by the first career catch for Jaheim Walters, the Demons crossed into Grizzlies territory for the first time before a chop block penalty erased a first-down gain and put the Demons in a first-and-25 situation.

After that moment, the Grizzlies scored a pair of touchdowns in less than two minutes to double their lead entering halftime.

Marcus Knight's 7-yard touchdown run capped an eight-play, 54-yard drive that put Montana ahead 19-0 before a failed 2-point conversion.

That score was compounded by a three-and-out by the Northwestern State offense that set up a blocked punt Tyler Flink returned 32 yards for a touchdown that extended the Grizzlies' lead to 26-0.

"It was still 19-0 at that time," Laird said. "We hadn't really gotten anything going offensively yet and had made some big plays defensively. Not to say that was the turning point in the game, but it was a big momentum boost for them going into halftime."

Penalties and turnovers conspired to work against Northwestern State. The Demons were whistled for 10 penalties covering 110 yards and lost the turnover battle 5-0.

SHREVEPORT — Two drives into Saturday's Shreveport Classic presented by the Caddo Parish Commission, the Northwestern State football team was rolling.

Already up a touchdown, the Demons had the ball inside the Grambling 10-yard line, looking to double its lead before Grambling turned an end-zone interception into an offensive onslaught.

The Tigers scored three plays after that key turnover, starting a run of touchdowns on six straight possessions to end the first half that set the tone for a 47-21 victory at Independence Stadium.

"We had a chance to extend the lead, and when we didn't, we let it snowball into a bad situation," fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. "That's 100 percent on me. I didn't do a good job getting this team ready to play. It starts with me, and it starts with these coaches preparing these young men during the week. Did not do it, did not continue to coach for four quarters and did not execute."

Northwestern State (0-2) racked up 137 yards on its first 14 plays before Donald Lee picked off Miles Fallin on first-and-goal from the Grambling 4.

That interception seemed to ignite the Tigers (1-1) and stifle the NSU momentum.

Three plays after Lee's interception, Maurice Washington broke a 61-yard touchdown run that included him hurdling a Demon defender. Jomard Valsin's blocked the extra point — one of three such blocks for the Demons on the night — to maintain a one-point NSU lead that stood for the next 5:05 until Washington broke a 25-yard scoring run.

The Tigers continued to pile on the chunk plays — especially the scoring type — throughout the second quarter.

With GSU leading 21-7, quarterback Quaterius Hawkins connected with Lyndon Rash on an 83-yard touchdown pass at the 10:43 mark of the second quarter and followed with scoring tosses of 20 yards to Claude Coleman and 71 yards to JR Waters before halftime.

"Every big play they had, we made a mistake," said senior safety PJ Herrington, whose fumble recovery in the third quarter marked the Demons' first takeaway of the season. "They didn't do anything special. We blew coverages. We didn't do what we were supposed to do."

It was the Demons doing what they wanted on offense, moving downfield nearly unimpeded as a popup shower made its way through the stadium in the first quarter.

HATTIESBURG, Mississippi – One of Northwestern State's keys to Saturday night's visit to Southern Miss was to try to win the field position battle.

The Demons were unable to do that, and the homestanding Golden Eagles took advantage.

A first-half scoring blitz, aided by excellent field position, put Southern Miss in the driver's seat, and the Golden Eagles cruised to a 64-10 victory at M.M. Roberts Stadium.

"From the start, we couldn't get anything going offensively," said fifth-year head coach Brad Laird, whose team avoided its second shutout loss of the season on Eddie Godina's 43-yard field goal in the third quarter.

"The first six drives, we had five punts and a turnover. Defensively, we held our own early and ended up giving up some big plays."

The Golden Eagles (1-2) scored on their first three drives Saturday night, part of a first half in which their average starting field position was their 44-yard line.

Meanwhile, the Demons (0-3) took until the second half to awaken offensively.

Northwestern State needed until its ninth drive to pick up its initial first down of the game. By then, the Golden Eagles had built a 27-0 lead.

The Purple Swarm defense stood tall early in the first quarter, stiffening twice in the red zone to force Southern Miss to settle for a pair of Briggs Bourgeois field goals.

The run of big plays for the Southern Miss offense began on a 3rd-and-12 from the NSU 40 when Ty Keyes found Jakarius Caston for a 40-yard score that pushed the Golden Eagles' lead to 13-0 less than 11 minutes into the game.

"We didn't start fast," Laird said. "We started slow, and it showed."

Swayze Bozeman's 12-yard fumble return touchdown 8 seconds into the second quarter marked the third non-offensive touchdown against the Demons this season and extended Southern Miss' lead to 20.

Taking advantage of a return game that averaged 19.8 yards on nine punt returns, the Golden Eagles had a pair of touchdown drives that started in Demon territory to push the lead to 34 on Caston's second scoring catch – a 7-yarder from Zach Wilcke.

NATCHITOCHEs – A goal-line stand by Northwestern State's defense unleashed a torrent of big plays for its offense Saturday afternoon in the Demons' Southland Conference opener against Lamar.

Buoyed by those big plays, NSU built a three-score lead and held off the visiting Cardinals, 35-26, at Turpin Stadium, securing the Demons' first win in a conference opener since 2018.

"We have a lot to play for," said senior defensive lineman Isaiah Longino, whose fourth-down tackle for loss sealed the pivotal second-quarter goal-line stand. "We understand our problems. We knew we were missing tackles. We weren't being physical. We had to flip the switch this week."

Lamar (0-4, 0-1) sprinted to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter, scoring on its opening drive after going 3-for-3 on third downs, including Nick Yockey's 8-yard touchdown pass to Jalen Dummett to open the scoring.

That would stand as Lamar's lone touchdown until the fourth quarter thanks in large part to Longino and the Purple Swarm's defensive line.

Trailing by 10, the Demons (1-3, 1-0) stood tall after Kristian Pugh returned an interception to the NSU 7 on the penultimate play of the first quarter.

The Purple Swarm bowed its collective back, stopping Lamar three times inside the 1-yard line, including one that was negated by an offside call.

Longino and Ronnie Caldwell combined for the final stop, dropping RJ Carver for a 1-yard loss on the second fourth and goal.

"Coach always tells us when we come of the field, 'Bow up. You've got to bow up,'" defensive tackle Maurice Campbell II said. "It's a sudden change. We've got to get the offense the ball back. That's what we did. They didn't score."

From there, the Demon offense ignited, scoring touchdowns on three straight drives before running out the final 58 seconds of the half.

Quarterback Zachary Clement made his most of his first start of the season, going 28-for-49 for 366 yards and a career-high-tying three touchdown passes. He added 51 rushing yards, including a 35-yard touchdown run that capped NSU's 21-point run in the second quarter.

Following the goal-line stand, Clement guided the Demons on a nine-play, 98-yard scoring drive that Javon Antonio ended with a 49-yard, catch-and-run score.

NATCHITOCHEs – Javon Antonio wasn't sure he was living the moment or if he was in a dream Saturday evening.

With his Northwestern State football team down 12 to Nicholls with 3:17 to play, Antonio and the Demon offense shook off a sluggish second half with aplomb.

Antonio hauled in a pair of touchdowns – the last with 9 seconds to play – and a 2-point conversion in the final 217 seconds, lifting Northwestern State to a wild 36-33 Southland Conference victory against Nicholls at Turpin Stadium.

"After I caught that touchdown, I thought of Jazz Ferguson and the McNeese game (in 2018)," Antonio said. "I was like, 'Wow, I'm really living this moment right now.' That was really exciting. I looked at the crowd and the coaches. When I looked at (head) coach (Brad) Laird, that's what really turned me up."

Antonio's grab on a 3-yard dart from quarterback Zachary Clement and the ensuing 2-point grab helped the Demons (2-3, 2—0) win their second straight game and produce the first 2-0 start in Southland Conference play since 2005.

Antonio's first touchdown catch – a 27-yarder – pulled the Demons within five with 1:34 to play, leading to Northwestern State's first onside kick attempt of the season.

Fittingly, it was another Demon receiver who came away with the ball as Zach Patterson tipped the ball to himself and gave Northwestern State one final hurrah.

"We had moved the ball the drive before and we came out with the onside, I knew we had to make a play and win the game," Patterson said. "We really push each other every day to see who can make the best plays. Whoever gets their hands on the ball, we have to make a play, each and every one of us."

The list of Demons who made those plays Saturday was a lengthy one, especially in the final two drives of the game where NSU ran 19 plays for 120 yards and tallied 15 points.

In addition to Antonio and Patterson, Ke'Nard King put his name in the ring for the biggest catch of the night.

On the Demons' final drive, King was unable to snare a catch on a second-and-10 pass. Two plays later, he made up for it, working his way back to make a sliding grab of a pass Clement found a way to get rid of while under duress.

CHARLESTON, Illinois – Two weeks in a row, the Northwestern State football team fought its way back from a double-figure deficit to find the win column.

Their third try in as many weeks fell just short Saturday afternoon at O'Brien Field.

Northwestern State trailed by 28 at halftime before pulling within eight points of host Eastern Illinois in the fourth quarter. The Panthers snuffed out a last-gasp push by the Demons, intercepting Zachary Clement with 19 seconds to play to preserve a 35-27 victory.

"We fought in the second half," fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. "As we go back and look at the full 60 minutes, we know what type of football team we are – the team that played the way they should in the second half. We've got to look and see what the issues were at the beginning of the game. Those are things, when you start like that, it starts with me. I've got to get that corrected."

The Panthers (2-3) set the first-half tone from their opening possession. After forcing the Demons into a three-and-out, EIU needed just five plays to cover 62 yards with quarterback Jonah O'Brien finishing the drive with the first of his two first-half rushing touchdowns.

O'Brien and fellow quarterback Dom Shoffner each rushed for a pair of first-half touchdowns as the Panthers built a 28-point lead at the break.

Eastern Illinois rushed for 254 yards in the first half before the Purple Swarm defense clamped down in the second half.

The Demons (2-4) limited the Panthers to 93 second-half yards but EIU had done its damage.

As the Purple Swarm began to round into form so did the Demon offense, which had managed only Zachary Clement's 10-yard touchdown pass to Zach Patterson in the first half.

That combination was much more productive – as was the Demon offense as a whole – in the final 19-plus minutes of the game.

Following Kevin Davis Jr.'s first career interception that gave the Demons the ball at the EIU 40, Clement capped an eight-play drive with a 14-yard touchdown run to slice the lead to 35-14.

"We're a never-say-die team," Clement said. "We're going to push ourselves and keep fighting until that clock runs out. That's the mentality we want. We tried to come back today, but we didn't have enough. It will make us better."

HOUSTON – The Northwestern State football team talked about starting fast for much of the first half of the 2022 season.

The Demons found Saturday night what had been missing, starting quickly and never looking back in a 37-10 Southland Conference win against Houston Christian at Husky Stadium.

“What a performance by our guys,” fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. “I go back to the team meeting Monday we had coming off last week. Our guys made up their mind coming out of that meeting what we had to do – putting it together for four quarters and starting fast.”

Northwestern State (3-4, 3-0) broke quickly, scoring 24 first-quarter points – its most in a single quarter since a 28-point second quarter against Sam Houston on Oct. 13, 2018,

NSU’s offense built off its strong second half from a week ago, scoring on its opening drive for the second time this season as Garrison Johnson capped a 10-play, 82-yard march with the first of his two 2-yard touchdown runs.

That opened the floodgates for a 24-point first stanza, NSU’s most first-quarter points in the Laird era.

The Purple Swarm defense did its part to aid the offense, intercepting HCU quarterback Justin Fomby twice in the first quarter as Dante Thomas and Keenan Leachman each collected their first career picks.

Those turnovers set the tone for the best performance by the Purple Swarm, which allowed 267 yards and just three points.

“It builds that trust that we can be that defense who can be dominant,” said senior defensive end Isaiah Longino, who moved into a fourth-place tie with Roy Locks on the NSU career sack chart with his 18.5th career sack.

“We’ve had great second halves throughout the season, and we decided this game we need to start fast and put it all together. I feel we did that.”

Longino’s two sacks were part of a season-best four-sack performance for the NSU defense, which continuously kept the Huskies (2-4, 1-2) in long-yardage situations and allowed just 3.3 yards per play.

It also allowed the Demons to breathe as the HCU defense slowed the Northwestern State offense after its early surge.

The Demons’ matchup Saturday against No. 16/18 Southeast Missouri State was not one of those days.

Northwestern State committed two first-quarter turnovers and SEMO recovered an onside kick in the stanza, allowing the Redhawks to build a big early lead and spoil NSU’s Homecoming with a 51-16 non-conference victory at Turpin Stadium.

“The unfortunate thing is I don’t think we gave ourselves the best opportunity to win,” fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. “The way you do that is by doing everything you’re supposed to do throughout the week to prepare yourself to be successful. When your football team does not do that, these types of outcomes happen.

“It’s one thing to say we did everything we were supposed to do during the week, and we just got beat. The tough part about it is when you know you didn’t, and this is the outcome.”

While the Demons (3-5) were charged with two turnovers in the first half, the visiting Redhawks (6-1) created two additional first-half possessions in the kicking game and extended another on special teams.

After the Redhawks took a 13-3 lead on Geno Hess’ 29-yard touchdown run, SEMO recovered an onside kick at the NSU 36. Two plays later, Hess scooted in from 4 yards out to make it 20-3 with 6:33 to play in the first quarter.

It appeared the teams had settled into more of a defensive battle in the second quarter before the Redhawks used a fake punt on fourth-and-3 from the Demon 44 to extend what became an eight-play, 51-yard touchdown drive.

Upback Will Weidemann barreled his way through a tackle near the line of scrimmage and eventually rumbled 22 yards to the Demon 22. Three plays later, Paxton DeLaurent found Damoria Vick for a 3-yard touchdown pass.

SEMO capped its first half of breaks by recovering a sky kick that was knocked down by the wind at the NSU 24-yard line. DeLaurent cashed in on that Demon miscue with a 12-yard touchdown pass to Johnny King with 1:41 to play in the half, building a 37-3 lead for the Redhawks.

COMMERCE, Texas – In a game where a Northwestern State offensive record fell, it was the Purple Swarm defense's performance that set the tone.

The Demons pitched a second-half shutout and utilized a career-high four touchdowns from quarterback Zachary Clement to roll to a 41-14 victory at Southland Conference newcomer Texas A&M-Commerce.

The win helped the Demons (4-5, 4-0) extend their best start to a Southland season since 1988 when NSU swept a six-game league slate. Northwestern State, the only unbeaten team in conference play, holds a half-game lead over UIW and a one-game lead over Southeastern with two weeks remaining.

NSU travels to Southeastern on Nov. 12 and wraps up the regular season by hosting UIW on Nov. 19.

"Defensively, from start to finish — you take away one maybe one play really — those guys played and prepared well throughout the week," fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. "It was a complete game in all three phases by this football team for 60 minutes. To be able to get the start we had offensively, be able to win the field-position game early, our guys put us in good situations."

Northwestern State put the homestanding Lions (5-4, 3-2) in a 14-point hole less than 12 minutes into the game, scoring touchdowns on consecutive nine-play drives that covered more than 80 yards each.

Kenneth Lacy capped the first with an 8-yard touchdown run before Javon Antonio laid out to haul in a 33-yard touchdown pass from Clement to double the Demon lead with 3:28 to play in the opening quarter.

The Lions responded with their only extended run of success against a Demon defense that limited A&M-Commerce to 243 yards, 147 yards below the Lions' season average.

Texas A&M-Commerce, which leads the Southland Conference in interceptions, got a tipped-ball pick off a Clement screen pass at the Demon 28 and tied the game two plays later.

That was enough to awaken both sides of the ball for Northwestern State, which kicked off a game-closing 27-0 run with an 11-play, 71-yard scoring drive that culminated in Jaheim Walters' first career touchdown grab — a 6-yard bullet from Clement.

HAMMOND – The Northwestern State football team built its best Southland Conference start in three-plus decades in part by winning the third-down battle, slowing opposing offenses.

The Demons could not find that same success Saturday afternoon at No. 25 Southeastern as the Lions halted NSU's four-game conference win streak with a 23-7 victory at a chilly Strawberry Stadium.

"That was the big thing on both sides of the ball," fifth-year head coach Brad Laird said. "We weren't able to convert any third downs and keep drives alive, and they were — especially in the first half. That put us in a hole."

Southeastern (7-3, 4-1) built a 23-point halftime lead by rolling up 313 first-half yards, more than the Demons (4-6, 4-1) had surrendered in three of its first four conference games.

The Lions converted 7 of 11 third-down tries in the first half against a Demon defense that had held its conference opponents to 35 percent on third downs.

NSU, meanwhile, went just 2 for 8 in the first half on third-down tries, roughly half of its 49-percent success rate in its first four Southland games.

The Lions converted three third downs on their opening drive of the game, a 13-play, 91-yard march that Carlos Washington Jr. capped with a 3-yard scoring run on third and goal.

Although the Purple Swarm allowed more than 300 first-half yards, it tightened up when backed up, holding Southeastern to a trio of field goals following the Lions' opening touchdown.

The Lions' defense, however, stifled the Demon offense.

NSU managed just 209 yards total offense, nearly 200 fewer than its season average and went into halftime scoreless for the first time since the season opener at then-No. 2 Montana.

"We weren't able to execute in all three phases," Laird said. "That started from the get-go. We never got anything going — never got any momentum. We didn't create any of that. When you go on the road in these kinds of games, you've got to do that and our team wasn't able."

The Purple Swarm was more effective in the second half, shutting out the Lions in the second half thanks to forcing three turnovers.

Linebacker Jared Pedraza collected his first career interception, picking off Cephus Johnson III midway through the third quarter.

The Demons, however, were unable to sustain that momentum, and once the visiting Cardinals grabbed hold, they never let go.

UIW answered NSU's opening drive touchdown with an onslaught of big plays and an avalanche of offense in a 66-7 victory that gave the Cardinals a share of the Southland Conference championship.

"Go back and look at the first half — the end of the first quarter, beginning of the second quarter — we had some opportunities," said fifth-year head coach Brad Laird, whose team finished the season 4-7 overall and 4-2 in Southland play. "We got the fast start we wanted, up 7-0. It's 14-7 (UIW) and we have a drive where we have a couple of drops and a drop on a fake punt that came in a situation to get the momentum back.

"In games like this, that's what you have to do. We weren't able to get the momentum back at that point. That wasn't the point that changed the game, but it was a big letdown early in the second quarter."

From there, the Cardinals (10-1, 5-1) piled on the points.

UIW needed just six plays to cover the 45 yards after the failed fake punt to build a 21-7 lead on Lindsey Scott's 18-yard touchdown run.

Scott engineered a balanced UIW attack that gobbled up 786 yards total offense -- 413 in the air and 373 on the ground. A seventh-year senior, Scott threw for 382 yards and five touchdowns, tying the Turpin Stadium record held by NSU's Zach Adkins and Sam Houston's Jeremiah Briscoe.

Running back Marcus Cooper added 254 rushing yards — the third-best performance in stadium history — and a pair of touchdowns.

The Demons' lone score came on the opening drive of the game when Zachary Clement found senior tight end LC Greenwood for a 1-yard score. It was Greenwood's second touchdown catch of the season — both coming at home in the same end zone.

"They came out and scored 66, so with an offense like that out there, you've got to respond and we didn't respond," Clement said.

### 80 JACKIE SMITH

Jackie Smith was a standout football and track athlete at NSU from 1959-62. He led NSU in receiving in two of his three seasons but made his true mark in an incredible 16-season pro football career. Smith caught 480 passes for 7,918 yards and 43 touchdowns as a tight end with the Cardinals and Cowboys. On July 30, 1994 Smith was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

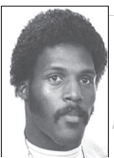


### 34 GARY REASONS

Gary Reasons played linebacker at NSU from 1980-83 and finished his career as the all-time leader in tackles with 394. He also set marks in single-season tackles with 172 in his as a senior and established a single-game mark with 24 stops against McNeese that same year. In nine NFL seasons, he won two Super Bowls. He was the first three-time All-American in Division I-AA history and was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame on August 17, 1996.

### 44 JOE DELANEY

Joe Delaney was an All-American in football and track from 1977-81. He set NSU's career rushing record with 3,047 yards and still holds the school single game record with 299 vs. Nicholls as a sophomore. He ran on NSU's NCAA Champion 1981 4x100 m relay. As a rookie with the Chiefs, he set four club rushing records and was the 1981 AFC Rookie of the Year. He drowned in a heroic rescue attempt in June 1983. He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1997.

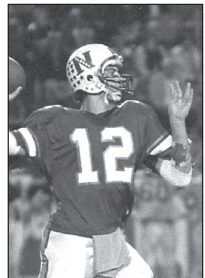

### 12 BOBBY HEBERT

Bobby Hebert, QB at NSU from 1979-82, still holds the NSU single-game passing and total offense records. He ran for 101 yards and threw for 364, hitting on 18-of-30 attempts in a 38-31 victory over UTA on Sept. 13, 1980. Hebert played 14 pro seasons - 11 in the NFL with the Saints and Falcons. As a rookie, he led Michigan to the USFL title and was MVP in the championship game. In the NFL, he completed 60% for 21,683 yards and 135 TDs.

### 41 AL DODD

Al Dodd was a two-time All-America safety from 1965-66 and led the 1966 Demons to an unbeaten 9-0 season and a No. 1 national ranking. He holds the state and Northwestern record with 31 career interceptions. He led the team in kickoff returns from 1964-66 and was also the top punt returner for those seasons. He was drafted by the Chicago Bears and later played eight seasons in the NFL with the New Orleans Saints as a receiver.

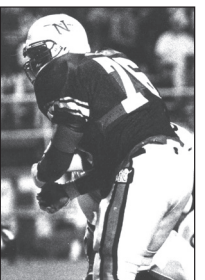

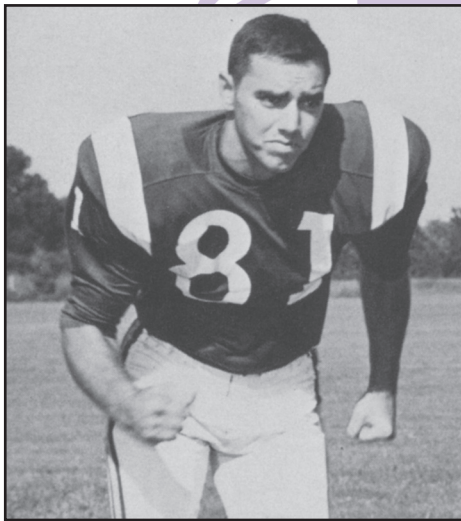

# ALL-AMERICAN DEMONS



**WALTER LEDET**  
*Guard - 1938*

A rugged offensive guard, the Abbeville native was the Demons' first football All-American in his senior year, 1938. He also became the school's first NFL Draft pick, going in the second round of the 1939 draft to Philadelphia. Recently married, he was able to make more money by staying at NSU to coach for Harry Turpin than by playing pro ball. He stayed for 50 years, eventually serving as registrar after a coaching career that earned him membership in the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. Ledet was pivotal in the careers of Demon greats Jackie Smith, Charlie Hennigan, and Charlie Tolar.



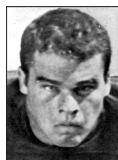
**PARKER WIGGINS**  
*Halfback - 1940*

The star offensive back for the 1939 unbeaten Normal Demons, Wiggins became the school's second All-America football player in 1940. As a single-wing tailback, he handled all the passing duties along with punting and being the primary running threat.



**DUDLEY DOWNING**  
*Center - 1953*

A 1953 Little All-American, Downing was an All-Gulf States Conference center. He was one of the top players on the 1953 GSC championship team. Downing was elected to the Graduate N Club Hall of Fame in 1974.



**ROBERT TATUM**  
*Guard - 1953*

All-American in 1953 and a three-time All-Gulf States Conference selection, Tatum starred at guard and linebacker. He helped lead the Demons to the 1953 GSC title. He was elected to the Graduate N Club Hall of Fame in 1972.



**CHARLIE TOLAR**  
*Halfback - 1958*

The "Tank" (5-foot-6, 210 pounds), twice Gulf States Conference MVP, set school career records for rushing (2,194 yards, now 10th) and scoring (182 points, sixth today). Tolar's 29-TD career total was tops nearly 50 years. He averaged 6.9 yards per carry in college, then won All-AFL honors three straight years (1961-63) with the Houston Oilers.



**JERRY BURTON**  
*Halfback - 1962*

An All-America safety in 1963 while earning All-Gulf States Conference for three seasons, Burton also was a standout running back. He won both the Best Defensive Back and Best Offensive Back team awards in 1963, when he led the team in rushing. Burton was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams.



**SAMMY JOE ODOM**  
*Linebacker - 1963*

One of the most Demons' most ferocious defenders, Odom was a 1963 All-America selection. He earned Outstanding Defensive Lineman and Outstanding Offensive Lineman awards for Northwestern, and went on to play two professional seasons with Houston. He was the 95th player chosen (Browns) in the 1964 NFL Draft.



**CORWYN ALDREDGE**  
*Defensive End - 1964*

A sixth-round (83rd overall) NFL (Browns) and fifth-round AFL (Patriots) 1965 draft pick, Aldredge was a 1964 All-America selection. A three-year starter at tight end, helping the 1962 Demons win the Gulf States Conference championship, he also was a standout defensive end.



**AL DODD**  
*Safety - 1965, 1966*

Truly one of the most gifted athletes ever to play at Northwestern, Dodd set a national record with 31 career interceptions, a mark that still stands as state and school records. On the unbeaten 1966 Demons' squad, Dodd was the biggest star, earning All-America honors and an invitation to play in the Senior Bowl. He moved across the ball to receiver in the NFL, playing most of his 7 season for the fledgling New Orleans Saints, finishing with 111 career receptions for 1,803 yards after beginning as a defensive back in 1967 for Chicago.



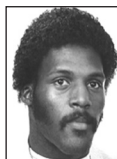
**LARRY WALLS**  
*Defensive Tackle - 1972*

A defensive end on coach George Doherty's 8-2 Gulf South Conference champions, Walls earned NAIA All-American honors after helping NSU hold its opponents to an average of 8.1 points and 264 yards per game.



**SIDNEY THORNTON**  
*Fullback - 1976*

The "Thundering Bull" broke the Demons' career rushing mark with 2,662 yards (now fifth), becoming the first NSU back to average 100 yards rushing in a season (100.1, 1976). First-team All-Louisiana and an All-American, Thornton was MVP in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic, then was drafted 48th overall (Steelers) and won two Super Bowls.



**JOE DELANEY**  
*Tailback - 1979, 1980*

A two-sport All-American, Delaney is in the College Football and Louisiana Sports halls of fame. He set NCAA, state and NSU records with a 299-yard, 4-touchdown rushing eruption vs. Nicholls in 1978 and finished as NSU's single-season (1,110 yards, 1980) and career (3,047 yards) rushing king. He was AFC Rookie of the Year (Chiefs). His No. 44 is retired.



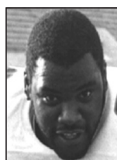
**WARREN GRIFFITH**  
*Center - 1980*

An All-America center in 1980, Griffith helped that squad set 33 Demon offensive records, including an average of 421 yards of total offense. Started at center for three years after moving from defensive end.



**GARY REASONS**  
*Linebacker - 1981, 1982, 1983*

A 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee, Reasons was the first three-time All-American in FCS history (and the only three-timer at NSU). He played 9 NFL seasons, starting in two Super Bowl wins. He set records of 172 tackles (1983), 394 in his NSU career. His No. 34 jersey was retired after his senior season.



**ARTHUR "TANK" BERRY**  
*Defensive Tackle - 1984*

The 1984 Gulf Star Conference Male Athlete of the Year, Berry was a Kodak Coaches' and AP All-America defensive tackle who led the Demons to a GSC title. All-Louisiana in 1982 and 1984, he made 77 tackles, including 9 sacks, as a senior when NSU led the nation in scoring defense (9 ppg).



**JOHN KULAKOWSKI**  
*Defensive End - 1987*

"Kool" was a 1987 All-America pick and the Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year after including a then school-record 15 sacks among his 96 tackles. A fiery four-year starter, he was part of the 1984 Gulf Star Conference co-champs. He made 28 career sacks and was a 1995 Graduate N Club Hall of Fame inductee.



**KEVIN LEWIS**  
*Defensive Back - 1988*

Just 5-foot-7 and not 150 pounds, he had to persuade Demon coaches to allow him to walk on as a cornerback. He went on to the NFL. An All-America cornerback with 13 pass breakups for the 1988 Southland Conference champs, Lewis had grown a bit before he played for Phoenix in 1989 and San Francisco from 1990-92.



**JOHN KING**  
*Offensive Line - 1990*

He could have accepted a scholarship to play for Army, but Springhill native John King headed south to NSU and the Demons got one of their more versatile and productive offensive linemen. King earned All-American honors as a senior in 1990 at center playing all five interior line positions in his career, a four-year starter. In 1988, he played guard as the Demons set school records for points, touchdowns and rushing yards while winning their first Southland Conference championship and reaching the Division I-AA playoff quarterfinals.



**GREG NECAISE**  
*Defensive End - 1990*

An All-American and All-Southland Conference end in 1990 after breaking the school record with 15.5 sacks, Necaise also holds the career record with 28.5 sacks. He made 191 tackles, 40.5 behind the line, and intercepted 3 passes. The 1989 Louisiana Newcomer of the Year, he was twice All-Louisiana first team.



**ANDRE CARRON**  
*Linebacker - 1991*

The Demons' tackles leader (season, 176, 1991; career, 521), "The Terminator" was a consensus All-America linebacker as a senior when he was one first-place vote shy of being the national player of the year. A three-year All-Southland Conference star, Carron played for the 1988 SLC champions.



**ADRIAN HARDY**  
*Cornerback - 1992*

All-American in 1992 and All-Southland Conference in his last two seasons as a cornerback, Hardy was the first Demon to play in the Hula Bowl. He blocked 10 career kicks. A second-round 1993 NFL Draft pick (48th overall) by the San Francisco 49ers, he played in 1994 and 1995 in Cincinnati.



**MARCUS SPEARS**  
*Offensive Lineman - 1992, 1993*

"Big Spears" and Jerry Rice are the only players from FCS programs ever chosen for the Football Writers of America All-America team (1993). One of 10 1993 Outland Trophy semifinalists, a two-year (1992-93) All-American and three-time All-Southland Conference tackle, he was a second-round 1994 NFL Draft choice (39th overall) who played 12 pro seasons.



**CLARENCE MATTHEWS**  
*Tailback - 1995*

Matthews' speed, powerful running style and kickoff return ability helped him break the school all-purpose yardage mark (4,651, now second all-time). All-America at tailback as a senior, he ran for a record 1,384 yards (now third) with 13 touchdowns. A Hula Bowl participant, he ranks sixth in career rushing (2,628).

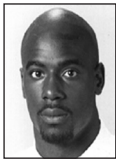
**TONY JOE MARANTO**  
*Safety-1997*

An All-America safety and the Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year in 1997, Maranto played in NFL Europe and with the Saints and Browns. He made 209 tackles in his last two seasons, 106 as a senior with 6 interceptions as the Demons shared the SLC title and made the playoffs.



**JERMAINE JONES**  
*Cornerback-1998*

Runner-up for the Buck Buchanan Award (national defensive MVP) and an All-American for the power-house 1998 Southland Conference champs, Jones was SLC Player of the Year and Louisiana Defensive MVP. A cornerback, he set NSU marks for season (21) and career (44) pass breakups and scored 5 touchdowns on returns in '98.



**ROBERT DANIEL**  
*Defensive End-1998*

A consensus All-America defensive end for the 1998 SLC champs, Daniel played in the East-West Shrine Game and the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. He overcame reconstructive knee surgery in 1997 to become a sixth-round 1999 NFL Draft pick (Carolina).



**MIKE GREEN**  
*Defensive Back-1998,1999*

A two-time All-America safety (1998, 1999), Green was among the best hitters in school history, twice winning national "play of the week" awards. A 9-year NFL veteran with Chicago and Seattle, Green led all pro defensive backs in tackles in 2002 despite being the last pick in the 2000 NFL Draft.



**WILLIAM BROUSSARD**  
*Center-1998,1999*

A two-time All-American center (1998, 1999), Broussard starred on the 1998 Southland Conference championship team that reached the national semifinals. One of 15 seniors nationally in 1999 named a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete, he also played for the 1997 SLC co-champions.



**TONY TAYLOR**  
*Running Back-2000*

A 2000 All-American, Taylor shattered NSU season and career rushing records. He has the top two season totals (1,506 in 2000, 1,441 in 1999), is first in career rushing (3,720 yards), attempts (688) and in 100-yard games in a season (8, 1999) and career (20). His averages per game (136.9, 2000) and career (112.7) are also tops.



**TERRENCE MCGEE**  
*Return Specialist-2000*

All-America as a punt returner in 2000, when he set an NCAA record with a 23.7 average including three long scores, McGee was a four-year starter at cornerback, sharing the career mark for pass breakups (44) while making 11 interceptions. A Pro Bowl kick returner with Buffalo in 2004, he played 10 NFL seasons.



**GENE TENNISON**  
*Offensive Line-2001*

Tennison played guard and tackle as a three-year starter, earning 2001 All-Southland Conference and All-America honors at tackle. NSU won the '98 SLC title and reached the playoff semis, and got back to the playoffs in his senior year. He also won an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was an SLC shot put champ.



**AHMAD WILLIS**  
*Defensive End-2001*

An All-American as a junior for the 2001 Demons, Willis made one of the biggest plays in school history, blocking a TCU field goal try to end NSU's 27-24 overtime win in '01. He had 21 career sacks, 10.5 in his junior year, and 42.5 for lost yardage (20 in 2001) among his 161 career tackles and was a two-time All-Southland Conference pick.



**ROY LOCKS**  
*Defensive End-2002*

A four-year starter and All-Southland Conference pick both at linebacker and defensive end, Locks won All-America honors in 2002 with 16.5 tackles for loss and 10 sacks among his 70 tackles. He had 224 career tackles, 37.5 for loss, and was a key on playoff teams in 2001 and 2002.



**JAMALL JOHNSON**  
*Linebacker-2003,2004*

A two-time All-American and Southland Conference Defensive Player of the Year in 2004 for the SLC champs, Johnson made 217 tackles in two seasons. Also a special teams standout with great speed, Johnson keyed record-breaking Purple Swarm defenses. He became a star in the CFL.



**QUINTENE NEWHOUSE**  
*Defensive Line-2003*

All-America at tackle as a junior, he played nose in 2004 for the Southland Conference champs and repeated as a first-team All-SLC pick. Newhouse made 155 career tackles, 29 for lost yards, notably forcing a fumble as ULM was trying to run out the clock, resulting in a last-second 2003 win.



**GREG BUCKLEY**  
*Offensive Line-2004*

An All-America guard for the 2004 Southland Conference champs, Buckley was a three-time All-SLC selection. He started for playoff teams in 2002 and 2004, earning first-team All-Louisiana honors in '04 after the Demons set a single-season scoring record and allowed only 6 sacks.



**DAVID PITTMAN**  
*Defensive Back-2005*

A 2005 All-American, the 2004-05 All-Southland Conference cornerback was a third-round (87th overall) 2006 NFL Draft choice (Ravens). A four-year starter, "Pitt" snagged 11 interceptions, broke up 26 passes, scored 4 touchdowns (three interception returns) and made 153 tackles. He was the only FCS player in the 2006 Senior Bowl.



**TORY COLLINS**  
*Defensive Tackle, 2005,2006*

The eighth two-time All-American in school history, Collins was a three-year All-Southland Conference selection at defensive tackle. He made 185 career tackles, 33 for loss. He helped the 2004 Demons win the SLC and reach the national playoffs after transferring from LSU as a freshman.



**DEMETRESS BELL**  
*Offensive Line-2007*

Originally recruited to play basketball for legendary coach Mike McConathy, Bell was noticed by the football coaches and given a try out at defensive line. He later moved to offensive tackle, where he remained for the remainder of his career. Bell was the 32nd Demon to be taken in the professional draft when he was chosen in the seventh round by Buffalo. He later became the starting left tackle.



**MICHAEL BOOKER**  
*Offensive Line-2010*

NSU's 40th All-American, he was the Demons top offensive lineman three straight years. He averaged in the high 70s in grade percentage every year in Natchitoches. Booker was a three-time All-SLC selection.



**DEREK ROSE**  
*Linebacker-2010,2011*

The ninth two-time All-American in school history, Rose was a three-year All-Southland Conference selection being voted to the first team his sophomore and senior years and second team junior year. He finished his career with 338 tackles.



**JUSTIN ALDREDGE**  
*Tight End-2011*

Justin Aldredge joined his grandfather Corwyn Aldredge on Northwestern State's elite group of football All-Americans. It was the first time in school history two members of the same family earned the honor. He had team highs of 39 catches for 514 yards and two touchdowns.



**IMOAN CLAIBORNE**  
*Cornerback-2014*

Imoan Claiborne capped his Northwestern State career with All-American honors after causing seven turnovers (four interceptions, three recovered fumbles) in his senior season. He and Ed Eagan gave NSU its first pair of All-Americans in the same season since 2010 (Booker, Rose).



**ED EAGAN**  
*All-Purpose-2014*

A former cornerback, Eagan shined as a wide receiver and return specialist as a junior. Eagan set a slew of school records, including kickoff return yardage in a season and a career as well as the single-season mark for receptions (73) in a breakout 2014 season.



**CHRIS MOORE**  
*Kicker-2015*

The school career record holder for scoring (248) and field goals (45) was a third-team All-American by both the Associated Press and STATS Inc. after a senior season in which he made 16 of 19 field goals, including a pair of 52-yarders, and 35 of 37

extra points.



**JAZZ FERGUSON**  
*Wide Receiver-2018*

In his lone season at Northwestern State, Ferguson established school records for receiving yards (1,117), touchdowns (13) and 100-yard receiving games (6), earning All-American honors from the Associated Press, STATS Inc., Hero Sports and Phil Steele.



**QUAN SHORTS**  
*Wide Receiver-2019*

A Texas Tech transfer, Shorts became the first Demon pass catcher to reach 100 receptions in a season, hitting it on the number despite battling turf toe over the final three games of the season and earning All-American honors from STATS FCS. In addition to his 100 grabs, Shorts caught 11 scoring passes.



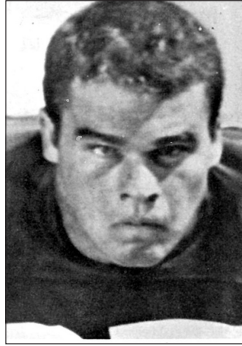
**JOMARD VALSIN**

# TURPIN Stadium

HOME OF THE NORTHWESTERN STATE DEMONS



Northwestern State is now in its fifth decade of playing home games in Turpin Stadium, named for Harry Turpin, the second all-time winningest coach in Demon football history.

Turpin, a four sport letterman at what was then Louisiana Normal in the mid-1920s, collected 98 victories during his 22 years as the Demons head coach. The stadium was renamed in his honor prior to the 1977 season.

Featuring an artificial playing surface, the 15,971-seat capacity stadium is the focal point of the NSU athletic complex, which also includes the NSU Fieldhouse.

The two deck west side of the stadium features a glassed-in area between decks which is reserved for members of the Demons Unlimited Foundation and other dignitaries. Also located on the west side are 5,000 comfortable chair back seats and a double-decked press box, complete with working press area, radio booths, and camera decks.

NSU students and the Spirit of Northwestern Marching Band sit on the east side of the field. Completing the complex is the NSU Fieldhouse, which opened in 1979. The Fieldhouse is home to administrative and coaching offices, dressing rooms, training rooms with up to date facilities, weight room, lounges, meeting areas, and film rooms. Other features include the plush Demon dressing room, equipment room, and laundry area with ample storage space.

## Demons in the NFL Draft

There have been 36 Northwestern State players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 10 in the last 14 seasons. Three Demons have gone in the top five rounds since 2002 (Craig Nall, 2002, 5th round, Packers; Terrence McGee, 2003, 4th round, Bills; David Pittman, 2006, 3rd round, Ravens). NSU's highest pick: RB John Stephens, 1988, 17th overall. The Demons' first-ever draft pick: OG Walter Ledet, Eagles, 2nd round, 1939; The busiest round for NSU players: 2nd, with 7 Demons selected. The busiest year: 1999, when 3 Demons were picked (cornerbacks Kenny Wright and Jermaine Jones, defensive end Robert Daniel). Defensive tackle Deon Simon was the latest Demon taken in the draft - selected in the 7th round by the New York Jets in 2015.

## Rookies of the Year

Two Demon greats have won pro Rookie of the Year awards. Tailback Joe Delaney was the 1981 AFC Rookie of the Year when he earned a trip to the Pro Bowl and was named Chiefs MVP after establishing a then-franchise record with 1,121 rushing yards, leading Kansas City to its first winning season since 1973. Seven years later, after breaking Delaney's Demon career rushing record, tailback John Stephens won the Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honor after running for 1,168 yards for New England.

## Demons with NFL Longevity

Among the dozens of former Demons to play pro ball, there are an elite group whose careers stretched for many years. Topping the list is Pro Football Hall of Fame tight end Jackie Smith, who played 16 years (1963-78). Pro Bowl quarterback Bobby Hebert played in the NFL from 1985-96 (11 seasons) after three years starring in the USFL, getting a total of 14 pro seasons. All-Pro receiver Mark Duper spent 11 seasons in the NFL (1982-1992), as did offensive lineman Marcus Spears (1995-2005). Receiver Floyd Turner got in 10 seasons (1989-1998) as did safety Mike Green (2000-2009). Linebacker Gary Reasons played 9 years (1984-1992), as did cornerback Randy Hilliard (1990-1998). Receiver Al Dodd (1967-74) had 8 NFL seasons, a long with offensive guard Petey Perot (1979-85), cornerback Kenny Wright (1999-2008). All-time AFL greats Charlie Hennigan and Charlie Tolar starred for the Houston Oilers for 7 years (1960-66), and Terrence McGee played 10 years (2003-12).

## The Cajun Cannon, Bobby Hebert

He came to Northwestern in 1978 as a T-formation quarterback with a difficult-to-understand, thick Cajun accent. At the end of his redshirt sophomore year, Bobby Hebert was an honorable mention All-America. Injuries slowed him in his final two seasons, but he went from NSU to the fledgling USFL and became an instant star, winning the championship game MVP award for the Michigan Panthers. That launched an incredible 14-year pro career highlighted by eight seasons when he led the New Orleans Saints to their greatest success. Hebert was 49-26 (.653) as the Saints starting QB, leading the club to its only division title and its best ever record. Today, he co-hosts the Big 870, WWL AM weeknights Sports Talk show in New Orleans and keeps close watch on his alma mater.

## NFL Focused on NSU in the 1999 Draft

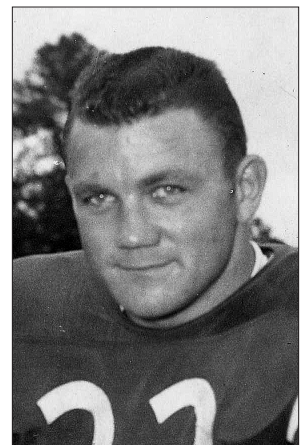
The 1998 Demons had three players (Kenny Wright, Jermaine Jones, Robert Daniel) chosen in the 1999 NFL Draft – more than were chosen from six of the Associated Press Top 25 major college teams, and as many or more than 12 of the AP Top 25, such as Penn State and UCLA. NSU led all Division FCS programs and Louisiana institutions with three selections. No other college in the country, at any level, had both starting cornerbacks selected.

## Legends of the AFL, Hennigan and Tolar

When the American Football League was created in 1960, former Demon track star and football player Charlie Hennigan was teaching biology and coaching at Jonesboro-Hodge High School, having been cut by the CFL's Edmonton Eskimos. Demon All-America fullback Charlie Tolar was drafted by Pittsburgh, but cut in 1959. They were among 160 hopefuls who participated in an AFL tryout camp for the Houston franchise, and both beat the odds to make the team. Each became instant All-AFL stars who made the Oilers' All-Time Team in the mid-1990s, voted by fans. Hennigan set pro records with 1,746 receiving yards in 1961 and 101 catches in 1964, marks that remained for 20-plus years. The 1,746 receiving yards still is third all-time, topped only by Jerry Rice and Isaac Bruce. Hennigan holds NFL records for consecutive 100-yard receiving games (7) and most 200-yard receiving games (3) in a season, and ranks second all-time with 10 100-yard receiving games in a season and four 200-yard career games. Tolar's 5-6, 220-pound frame earned him nicknames like "Tank" and "The Human Bowling Ball" and his bullish style made him a hero to future NFL star Larry Csonka while earning him a pair of All-AFL honors. His colorful lifestyle earned him a line in a Willie Nelson song: "Men like Charlie Tolar, when they made him, they broke the mold."

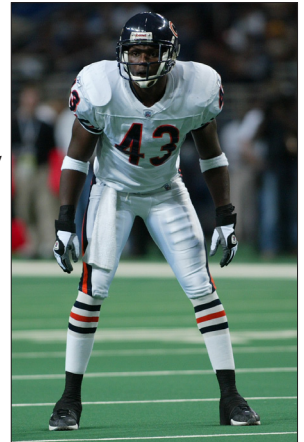
## Big Red, Jackie Smith

For a track standout whose hurdling skills made him most attractive to the Demons coming out of Kentwood High School, Jackie Smith made the most of his opportunity at NSU from 1959-62. His stats in football were modest in the run-based offenses of the early 1960s, but his size and speed interested pro scouts. Few 10th-round draft picks have worked out so spectacularly. Smith's rugged style, combined with his speed and athleticism, redefined the position of tight end in the NFL in the late 1960s. He made five straight Pro Bowl appearances for the St. Louis Cardinals from 1966-70 and retired after the 1978 season as the NFL's all-time leading tight end with 480 career catches for 7,918 yards. He played in 121 consecutive games. In 1994, Kentwood came to Canton. "Big Red" was inducted in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

## Last But Not Least, Mr. Irrelevant

Among the 34 Demons chosen in the NFL Draft, two hold a special distinction – they were the last players chosen in that year's draft. Receiver Mike Almond was the 330th and last selection in 1979, going to the Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers. Safety Mike Green went as the 248th choice in the 2000 draft, to Chicago. They were each the guests of honor for the "Irrelevant Week" celebration in Newport Beach, Calif., in June, making NSU the only program to have two "Mr. Irrelevants" in the history of the festivities. Almond made it to the last cut but the Steelers had receivers Lynn Swann

and John Stallworth, both in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Green not only made the Bears' roster, he was their second-leading tackler over his last six seasons and he was traded to NFC champion Seattle, where he played for two more years.

## Rookie Star, Veteran Style

Along with winning the 1988 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year award, former NSU tailback John Stephens was awarded the first Gale Sayers Humanitarian Citation in 1988. Stephens was the choice of a committee headed by Sayers, the Hall of Fame running back who starred for the Chicago Bears. The award is given to the National Football League rookie demonstrating the most outstanding commitment of time and effort toward a personally designated charitable organization, which in Stephens' case was the Roxbury (Mass.) Comprehensive Community Health Center.

## The Turtle, All-Pro Terrence McGee

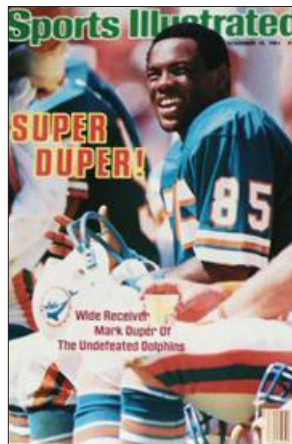
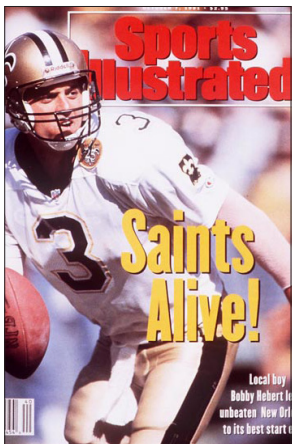
The Turtle came out of his shell in a big way. Cornerback Terrence McGee earned the nickname "Turtle" because of the way he wore his shoulder pads around his head until the last possible moment before preseason practices, to keep his head in the shade. McGee became a starter as a true freshman, and became a star a year later. He ran three punts back for touchdowns, broke the NCAA single-season record for punt return yardage and today stands as the Division I-AA all-time record holder for best career punt return average (17.6, 1999-2002). In his second pro season, 2004, he made the Pro Bowl as a return specialist and emerged as one of the NFL's better cover cornerbacks for Buffalo, in a 10-year NFL career.

## Track and Football, a Demon Tradition

Dating to the 1930s, football and track have been intertwined at Northwestern. The Demons' first football All-American, Walter Ledet, was a track stalwart who became one of the great track coaches in state history, earning him a place in the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame. His powerhouse track programs attracted future pro greats Charlie Hennigan and Jackie Smith to Northwestern. Since then, many outstanding Demon football players have been two-sport stars, including track All-Americans and future pro players Joe Delaney, Mark Duper, Victor Oatis, Al Edwards and Ronnie Powell. Duper had never played football until Delaney and Oatis teased and prodded him into giving it a try for his junior season, 1980. Two years later, Duper was a second-round NFL Draft pick on the way to three Pro Bowls. In 1981, Delaney, Oatis, and Duper ran on the NCAA Division I champion 4x100 meter relay team. NSU remains the only FCS program ever to win an NCAA relay championship men or women indoors or outdoors.

# DEMON FOOTBALL TRADITIONS

## All-Americans

In 116 seasons of intercollegiate football, 44 Northwestern players have earned first or second-team All-America honors. Offensive guard Walter "Cajun" Ledet, later a highly-successful Demon track and field coach and assistant football coach, was the school's first All-American in 1938. Only nine players — safety Al Dodd in 1965-66, tailback Joe Delaney in 1979-80, linebacker Gary Reasons in 1981-83, offensive tackle Marcus Spears in 1992-93, center William Broussard in 1998-99, safety Mike Green also in 1998-99, linebacker Jamall Johnson in 2003-04, defensive tackle Tory Collins in 2005-06, and linebacker Derek Rose 2010 and 2011 — won All-America honors in more than one season. Reasons became the first three-time All-American in Division I-AA history. In 1993, Marcus Spears became only the second I-AA player ever (along with Jerry Rice) to make the Football Writers Association of America All-America team. William Broussard and Mike Green, members of the memorable 1998 team which advanced to the national semi-finals for the first time in the program's history, are the only two teammates at Northwestern to earn All-America status in consecutive seasons.

## Chief Caddo (Discontinued)

At 7 feet, 6-inches tall and 320 pounds, Chief Caddo was the biggest trophy in college football. The wooden Indian statue was awarded to the winner of each year's Northwestern vs. Stephen F. Austin game. The stately Chief is symbolic of the kinship between the cities of Natchitoches and Nacogdoches, home of SFA. He was named "Chief Caddo" to honor the Indian tribe that not only first settled the two communities, but provided safety for the early white settlers in the area. The statue originated in 1960, when Northwestern and SFA decided the loser of their 1961 game would have a tree chopped down from its nearby forest to be sent to the winning school, who would have a statue carved. The Demons won that 1961 matchup 35-19 and SFA delivered a 2,000-pound black gum log to Northwestern. Harold Green of Logansport spent over 230 hours carving the statue.

Northwestern held a 31-21-1 advantage in the series which ended in 2019 after the Caddo Nation asked the tradition to be discontinued. In the 56 years of the Chief's life, he spent 37 in Natchitoches. The teams did not play each other from 1965-68 or in 1973.

To those who know the Chief best, that comes as no surprise. Even an SFA coach admitted a few years ago that the Chief seemed to like Natchitoches, blaming it on meat pies and Cajun cooking. But veteran Northwestern followers know his allegiance goes even deeper. After all, if you were a wooden statue, would you want to spend time around a bunch of Lumberjacks?

## Flaming N logo

The distinctive Northwestern State athletic logo was designed in 1983 at new football coach Sam Goodwin's request, in a collaboration between former kicker Dale Quickel, former defensive back J.P. Dunbar and former Miss Northwestern Cheryl Purcell, an art teacher. The outline of Louisiana was added in 1999 at the suggestion of Demon baseball coach John Cohen.



## Conference champions

Since World War II, the Demons have won or shared 11 conference titles. Northwestern won Gulf States Conference crowns outright in 1953, 1962 and 1966 and shared the title in 1957-58. The Demons won the Gulf South crown in 1972, then shared the Gulf Star Conference championship in 1984. Northwestern won the Southland Conference title in 1988 with a 20-17 victory at No. 1-ranked Stephen F. Austin in the final game of the regular season. In 1997, the Demons shared the title with McNeese State. In 1998, NSU made it back-to-back championships winning the title outright with a 6-1 conference mark and in 2004, NSU shared the title with Sam Houston State after posting a 4-1 league mark.

## The Delaney Memorial

The Demons' spring practice ends each year with the Delaney Bowl, honoring the memory of heroic two-sport All-American Joe Delaney. It's one of several ways NSU honors his memory. There is a display underneath the west side of Turpin Stadium. His No. 44 jersey was retired at halftime of his final game as a Demon. The players elected as permanent team captains by their teammates receive the Joe Delaney Memorial Leadership Awards. Displays in the football offices on the Big John Evans Walk of Honor list those captains and showcase Delaney's achievements and impact. Each spring since 2012, the Delaney Distinguished Supporter Award is presented to an individual whose involvement with NSU athletics is dynamic.

The Demon football offices, as well as the offices for the track and baseball coaching staffs, are located on the second floor of the NSU Fieldhouse. On June 8, 1991, the area was named "The George Doherty Wing" in memory of the former Demon head coach and athletic director, who spearheaded planning of the ultramodern facility.

## Fight song

When Jeff Matthews' Spirit of Northwestern Marching Band plays it, the music is called "Trio to British Eighth March" but the lyrics lend a distinct Demon flair:

Go, ye Demons, take the field  
Northwestern Demons never yield  
So fight Demons, win tonight  
Victory is on our side

Purple and White shall ever reign  
Filling the air with battle strain  
So Demons forever stand  
And fight for dear old Demon-land!

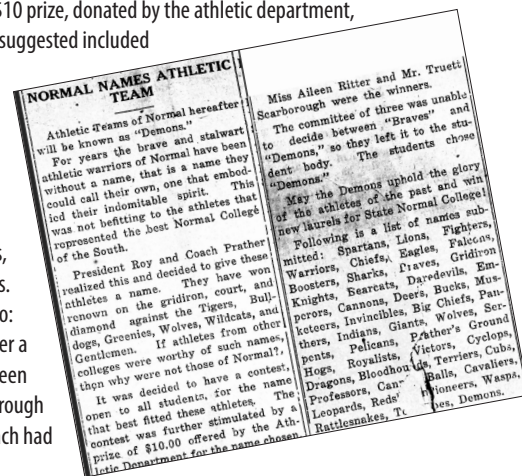


All Northwestern players learn the fight song during their first week of preseason practice as Demons. The team sings the song after each win.

## How we became the Demons

In 1923, when Northwestern was known as Louisiana Normal College, President V.L. Roy and Coach H. Lee Prather held a contest, open to students, to choose a nickname for Normal's athletic teams. A \$10 prize, donated by the athletic department, was on the line. Names suggested included

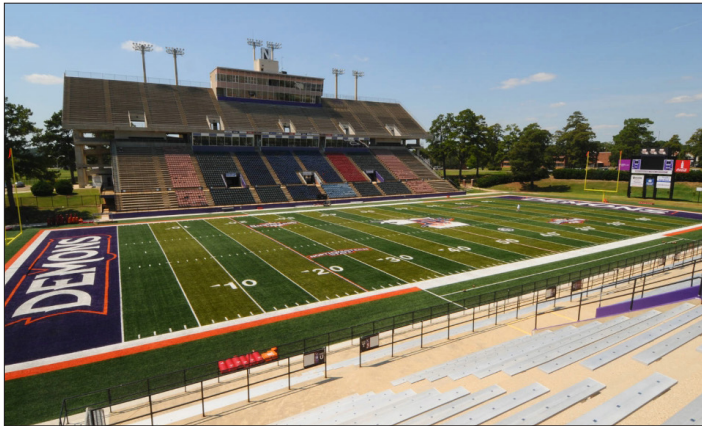
the Gridiron Knights, Daredevils, Boosters, Sharks, Cannons, Deers, Muskateers, Invincibles, Ground Hogs, Royalists, Cyclops, Bloodhounds, Professors, Cannon Balls, Wasps, and Rattlesnakes. A committee tabbed two: Braves and Demons. After a vote of the students, Aileen Ritter and Truett Scarborough split the \$10 because each had suggested "Demons."





## Stadium namesakes

At least four Demon coaches have stadiums named after them. NSU's Turpin Stadium for football honors 22-year head coach Harry "Rags" Turpin. NSU's Ledet Track Complex pays tribute to head track and assistant football coach Walter Ledet. NSU's Brown-Stroud Field baseball stadium pays tribute, in part, to longtime assistant football and head baseball coach Alvin "Cracker" Brown. Louisiana Tech's Aillet Stadium honors longtime head coach Joe Aillet, who grew up in Natchitoches, played for the Demons and was an assistant coach on the 1939 undefeated team before being hired as head coach of the rival Bulldogs. Brown replaced him on Turpin's staff, which also included Ledet.



## Retired jerseys

Hundreds of players have worn the Purple and White in the nine decades of Northwestern football, but only five have had their jersey numbers permanently retired. Al Dodd (41), an All-American on the unbeaten 1966 team, was the first to receive this honor. Joe Delaney's No. 44 was retired at halftime of his final game in 1981. Gary Reasons' No. 34 was set aside after his career ended in 1983. Jackie Smith's No. 80 was retired at homecoming 1994. In 1997, the familiar No. 12 jersey worn by Bobby Hebert was retired during halftime ceremonies of homecoming.

## The State Fair Classic

Gone, but not forgotten. For 40 years, old rivals Northwestern and Louisiana Tech played in Shreveport during the first weekend of the Louisiana State Fair. After the game, players and fans from both teams often made their way down the midway, enjoying the rides and carnival games. The series ended when Louisiana Tech withdrew after the 1987 meeting, halting what at the time was the South's oldest active Division I-AA rivalry. The teams played for "The Rag," a banner displaying names and colors of both schools which hung in the Student Union of the winning team for the next year.

## Trident Test

Each spring and before fall practice, the Demon players go through a series of strength, speed and conditioning tests. Since three aspects of athleticism are being tested, they were named "Trident Tests" by the coaching staff. Each player is awarded an overall grade based on his combined ranking among all team members in every test. The winner receives the Kirt Straughter Memorial Award, named in honor of the 1989 Trident Test winner who drowned that year.



## Spirit of Northwestern Marching Band

Nearly 300 strong, the dynamic Northwestern band has never lost a halftime show under the direction of director Bill Brent. The band's enthusiasm was a major factor, said Coach Sam Goodwin, as Northwestern's "Road Warriors" won key SLC games at North Texas and Stephen F. Austin to capture the 1988 SLC title. At home games, it's a treat to watch Brent's game day rehearsals, now led by Brent's successor Jeff Matthews.

## How Vic became Vic

On September 22, 1984, the Demon mascot received his official name by means of another contest, sponsored by the Athletic Department. The contest was open to faculty, staff, and students. The objective to find a name for the Demon. Over 300 entries were submitted to the committee. The grand prize was an all expense paid weekend at the Louisiana State Fair Classic. Ray Carney, an alum of the University, was the official winner with "Vic" which is short for "Victory."



## Vic the Demon 1, Chief Brave Spirit 0

Few events in Southland Conference history attracted as much attention as the Oct. 24, 1992, spontaneous scrap between Northwestern's mascot, Vic the Demon, and Northeast's Chief Brave Spirit. "The Tussle in Turpin" happened midway through the second quarter of the Homecoming game. KTBS-TV's Sam Schachter made it his "Play of the Day" and the footage was picked up by ESPN -- who declared Vic the victor. Even Monroe's News-Star newspaper and KNOE-TV conceded the decision to Vic, who rallied after the Chief knocked off his head. Scott Ostler of the San Francisco Chronicle called it "the fight of the year" and wrote, "Vic won a unanimous decision. It's been a long time since I've seen a fight where someone's head actually gets ripped off -- and yet he rallies to win!"

The footage made its way around the country, appearing on CNN Sports Tonight, ESPN College Gameday, NBC's Today Show, KNBC in Los Angeles, WUSA in Washington, D.C., and many other TV outlets. USA TODAY featured the mascot melee in its Oct. 28, 1992 issue. At year's end, the fight was named -- by viewer vote -- fourth on CNN's Plays of the Year" show. The frisky mascots met again, with plenty of fanfare but no altercation, when NLU visited for a Jan. 30 basketball game.

Shane Clabaugh, the senior social work major who served as Vic, explained: "After he tore my head off, that was it. That goes against the code of ethics for mascots." Clabaugh said he won: "I scored a takedown. I was mad because he knocked my head off. I wanted to take off his head -- his real one."

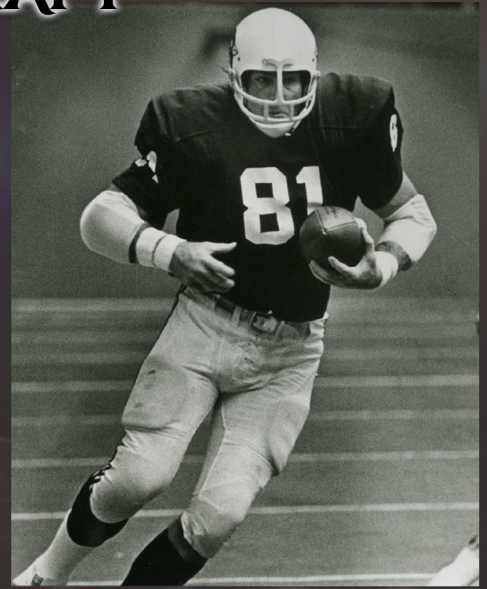

## Dr. Marcus Jones *Northwestern State President*

**Dr. Marcus Jones** was named the 20th president of Northwestern State University on Nov. 8, 2021 after a unanimous vote by the Board of Supervisors for the University of Louisiana System, which governs Northwestern State.

Jones has an extensive academic, business and legal background, having served as executive vice president and chief operating officer for the University of Louisiana System for the past year, where oversaw the areas of business finance, internal/external audit function, EEO and IT for the System and handled matters of system level importance on behalf of the UL System president. He also oversaw management of budgets, administration,

policies and procedures and international relations and acted as the legal liaison for the System.

Jones served as NSU's executive vice president for university and business affairs from 2017-2020 where he was a key administrator in the planning, operation and management of the University. He oversaw University Police, the Environmental

Health and Safety office, Grounds Department and the Physical Plant and was responsible for construction, maintenance, custodial and general upkeep of all University facilities and grounds. He also reviewed and executed University leases and cooperative agreements and oversaw the environmental health and safety officer. He was NSU's vice president for university affairs from 2007 to 2017.

Jones holds a bachelor's degree in business administration and finance from Northwestern State, a master's in international trade and finance from Grambling State University and a law degree from Southern University Law Center where he was managing editor of the Southern Law Review. He also studied international business and finance at the University of Plymouth in Plymouth, England.

Jones has been a member of Northwestern's faculty since 1994 as an instructor of business, assistant professor of business law and international business, associate professor of business law and international business and has held the Ben D. Johnson Endowed Professorship since 1999. Proficient in Spanish and French, he led the university's international recruiting efforts, which substantially increased the number of students at NSU from outside the U.S.

Jones has also been treasurer and a consultant to the Ben D. Johnson

Educational Foundation and finance/accounts manager and consultant for the Ben D. Johnson Construction and Finance Co. In his role with the construction and finance company, Jones supervised subcontractors at construction sites, managed the company's operating budget, provided financial oversight and worked in economic development. He has also served as treasurer and consultant of the Northwest Louisiana Athletic League and has served in several capacities including co-editor of "Calaloo," a literary magazine based at Texas A&M.

He is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., the American Bar Association and the Louisiana State Bar Association.





## Kevin Bostian

*Director of Athletics*

**Kevin Bostian** took control of the Northwestern State athletic department in February 2022, three weeks after being named NSU's new Director of Athletics.

In his first full year at the helm of the department, Northwestern State athletics enjoyed its first top-five finish in the Southland Conference Commissioner's Cup since 2014-15, tying for fourth in the league.

The highlight of the competitive year was the first Southland Conference Indoor Track and Field championship in Lady Demon history, part of a track and field campaign that saw both men's and women's track and field collect top-two finishes in both the indoor and outdoor meets.

Bostian also upheld NSU's tradition of community impact as the department captured its second Southland Strong Community Service Award, joining the inaugural award it landed in 2014-15.

Regarded as a team builder with an innate ability to raise funds, Bostian came to Natchitoches after nearly two years at UNC Greensboro, serving as the Spartans' executive associate athletic director for development.

While at UNCG, the 43-year-old Bostian had the athletic department on pace for its highest fundraising year in school history. In his final full year at UNCG, the athletic department raised \$1.8 million in funds, surpassing its goal by 50 percent.

Throughout his nearly two-decade long career in college athletic administration, Bostian has consistently surpassed his goals and currently has UNCG on pace for its highest fundraising year in school history in the 2022 fiscal year. In his first year with the Spartans, UNCG athletics raised \$1.8 million in funds for the department, surpassing their goal by 50 percent.

He also oversaw the UNCG athletics ticketing, marketing and promotions and athletics communications offices and was the sports administrator for the UNCG men's basketball team, which won the Southern Conference regular-season and tournament championships and reached the NCAA Tournament.

In addition to his role in the external operations department, Bostian served as the interim athletic director at UNCG from September 2021 through earlier this month.

Before coming to UNCG, Bostian was a major gifts officer at his alma mater, North Carolina State. As the officer in charge of gifts of more than \$50,000, Bostian secured nearly \$2.5 million in gifts in his 25 months with The Wolfpack Club.

Prior to his arrival at NC State, Bostian spent almost four years as Georgia Southern's senior associate athletic director and executive director of the athletic foundation where he increased the athletic department's revenue three straight years and helped cultivate a record number of donors four straight years. While at Georgia Southern, Bostian secured the second-largest cash gift in the department's history and helped GSU

push its athletic revenue to \$3.909 million during the 2017 fiscal year.

A veteran of mid-major college athletics, Bostian spent more than three years at Tennessee Tech as its associate athletic director for development, serving as the department's chief fundraiser. Bostian secured the largest gift in Tennessee Tech athletics history, maintained a portfolio of more than 200 donors and increased total donor revenue by 80 percent, total number of donors by more than 77 percent and total number of major gifts by 58 percent.

Bostian spent nearly seven years at East Tennessee State in Johnson City, Tennessee, starting as a marketing, promotions, merchandise and licensing coordinator before moving into the director of corporate sales, marketing and regional athletic advancement position. He then spent three years as ETSU's assistant athletic director of corporate development and regional athletic advancement.

In his time as the assistant athletic director, Bostian increased corporate sponsorship cash revenue and total revenue all three years and overall boosted cash revenue by 69 percent and total revenue by 47.6 percent. He developed, implemented and solicited donors on a capital campaign for a new weight room and a phase of the baseball stadium project at ETSU.

Bostian began his athletic administration career as a marketing specialist at South Alabama and spent a year as the sports marketing coordinator at the Gwinnett County Sports Commission in metro Atlanta.

A 2000 magna cum laude graduate of North Carolina State in business management, Bostian earned his master's of business administration and master's of sports administration from Ohio University in 2002.

He and his wife, Megan, have three children, Ayla, Zoe and Piper.



## Bryn EDMONSTON DILL

Athletic Academic Coordinator

1ST YEAR AT NSU

A Northwestern State alumnae, **Bryn Edmonston Dill** joined the NSU athletic department as an athletic academic coordinator in February.

## Patric DuBOIS

Deputy Athletic Director

22ND YEAR AT NSU

One of the most successful tennis coaches in Southland Conference history, **Patric DuBois** added the title of deputy athletic director to his resume in June 2021 while continuing in his role as the director of NSU's Dr. Randall J. Webb Wellness, Activity and Recreation Center (WRAC).

DuBois is no stranger to wearing multiple hats as he was formerly NSU's head tennis coach, director of wellness & recreation and assistant athletic director for special projects concurrently. In his newest role, DuBois oversees areas of sport performance, facilities & event management, and capital projects for the Department of Athletics. DuBois continues to assist and act as a liaison with the Lady Demon tennis program.

He was an integral part of Northwestern State's implementation of its ESPN+ infrastructure ahead of the 2022-23 athletic calendar.

DuBois was instrumental in transitioning an intramural program in 2005 into a department, adding wellness, fitness, club sports, e-sports, and informal recreation, to create one of the strongest collegiate recreation departments in the state of Louisiana. In 2005, renovations were completed to open the WRAC to house this programming. The facility doubled in size to 90,000 square feet.

In his role as assistant athletic director, DuBois assisted in several projects to enhance various areas in Prather Coliseum, Athletic Field House, and all outdoor facilities in the NSU athletic footprint. DuBois has played a prominent role in the execution of the biannual Athletic Scholarship Auction which has helped raise funds to assist fully funding athletic scholarships for deserving Division I athletes.

As a coach, DuBois developed a track record of developing nationally competitive teams and players who succeed on the court and in the classroom.

As NSU's head coach from 1989-94, 2006-2014 and 2018-20, he led the Lady Demons to a combined three Southland Conference Tournament titles, five regular season titles and two NCAA Tournament appearances.

In 26 seasons of collegiate head coaching, DuBois led Northwestern State and Texas-Arlington (1995-2003) to 13 Southland Conference regular season titles, 11 Southland Conference Tournament titles, and nine NCAA Tournament appearances.

His career record sits at 425-240, including a staggering 206-52 mark in Southland Conference play. Before he stepped down, he was 20th in career wins nationally among all active Division I women's tennis coaches.

DuBois' wife, Lise, is a Natchitoches native and an instructor in the business department & department of family and consumer sciences at Northwestern State University. They have one daughter, Mazie Catherine, who earned her undergraduate degree from LSU. She and Zachary Ashworth of DeQuincy were married in June 2021.

NCAA Compliance Director

27TH YEAR AT NSU

**Dustin Eubanks** is in his 27th year in the NSU athletic department and his 24th year at the helm of NSU's compliance department, keeping all athletics personnel current and in accordance with NCAA and Southland Conference guidelines.

Fletcher oversees the Northwestern State athletic academic staff after arriving in Natchitoches following a little more than a year as the assistant athletic director for athletic academic services at Grambling.

While at GSU, Fletcher directed and oversaw the Student-Athlete Leadership Academy that developed and facilitated workshops on key topics of leadership development for teams and staff and was Grambling's department liaison for the ARISE STEM Mentoring Program, instituted in conjunction with NCAA Leadership Development and AthLEDA.

## Scott MAGGIO

Director of Ticketing/Annual Fund

2ND YEAR AT NSU

Scott Maggio was named Northwestern State's director of ticket operations and annual fund in June 2022 while serving in the same role as interim since November 2021.

Maggio directs sales for all of Northwestern State's ticketed sports and additional non-competition-based events.

In less than two years on the job, Maggio has made his mark in the stands at NSU's athletics facilities. He increased NSU men's basketball single-game ticket revenue by 253 percent in the 2022-23 season, marking the highest point for Demon hoops since 2014-15. Similarly, he raised women's basketball's single-game ticket revenue by 148 percent to its highest level since the 2012-13 season.

In two seasons, Maggio has increased overall baseball season-ticket revenue by 27 percent. Since joining the department, Maggio also has played a role in landing the largest single gift in NSU Athletics history — a \$1.5 million donation from David and Sherry Morgan.

Before joining NSU's staff, Maggio worked in marketing and human resources at BOM where he curated a monthly newsletter, made quarterly progress presentations to the board of directors and maintained the budget sheet for the marketing department. Maggio also helped BOM become the first business to do an NIL deal with NSU Athletics.

While pursuing his master's degree in sport management at LSU, Maggio worked in the LSU athletic ticket office where he was involved with single-game sales for all six of LSU's ticketed sports — football, baseball, softball, gymnastics and men's and women's basketball.

While an undergraduate student at Louisiana Tech, Maggio was a manager with the Bulldog track and field team after his track career ended at Louisiana Tech, coordinating the annual Mook 4 Cross Country Invitational and the Jim Mize Track and Field Invitational.

Maggio has a wealth of volunteer experience, working four years with the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame and with the Radiance Technologies Independence Bowl.

A Natchitoches native, Maggio completed his master's degree in sport management from LSU in May 2022 and his bachelor's degree in communication from Louisiana Tech in March 2020. A two-time state champion 1,600-meter runner at St. Mary's Catholic School, Maggio and his wife, the former Mary-Katherine Horton, were married in May 2023.

**Trevor McCune** joined the Northwestern State staff in June 2022 as an academic coordinator and quickly became a valuable member of the department.

McCune works with the

## Darian WESTERFIELD

Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs

### 1ST YEAR AT NSU

A veteran college athletics administrator who has worked at virtually every level of the industry, **Darian Westerfield** joined the Northwestern State athletic department as its Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs in November.

Westerfield brings more than two decades of experience in collegiate sports administration to his position, which coordinates and oversees external messaging for Northwestern State athletics, including marketing, development, ticketing and communications.

Westerfield comes to Natchitoches after spending the past 16 months at Pittsburg State University in Kansas. Westerfield joined the Pitt State staff as the assistant athletic director for external engagement in August 2021 and was promoted to associate AD in July 2022.

While at Pitt State, Westerfield oversaw and coordinated all external engagement activities for Gorilla athletics. He served as the department's liaison to Peak Sports Management while also overseeing the Silverback Fund, the Pitt State athletics' annual giving program.

During his tenure at Pitt State, Westerfield also served on the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association Conference Basketball Championship Committee.

A Missouri native, Westerfield spent one year at Drury University in Springfield, Missouri. As Drury's associate director of athletics for external affairs, Westerfield was responsible for all revenue generation in the athletic department and raised that number by 42 percent in his lone season there.

His time at Drury was the latest stop in a college athletics career that began at Memphis in 2002 when Westerfield was the Tigers' athletic annual giving coordinator. There he helped the Tigers raise more than \$9 million in a little more than two years.

From there, Westerfield went to Northern Illinois as its assistant director of development where he raised \$1.036 million and assisted with NIU's \$7 million capital campaign.

After a three-year stint at Western Kentucky as the associate director of the Hilltopper Athletic Foundation, which raised more than \$1 million annually, Westerfield moved into his first senior staff position as the assistant director of athletics for development at

Indiana State. With the Sycamores, Westerfield assisted with a \$2.5 million renovation of Bob Warn Field at Sycamore Stadium, home of ISU baseball, and created a suite area for Sycamore basketball games that generated \$10,000 in new revenue.

After three years at Indiana State, Westerfield spent two years as the assistant director of athletics for external affairs at Morehead State where he increased external revenue by 30 percent from the 2012 fiscal year to 2013. He also worked with the Ohio Valley Conference to help create the OVC Digital Network and helped implement a department-wide apparel contract with Russell Athletic.

As St. Bonaventure's senior associate director for external relations, he increased annual giving by 25 percent in his first year and was the main fundraiser for a \$2.2 million upgrade to the school's soccer and lacrosse field. He also worked with St. Bonaventure's senior leadership to identify and solicit a corporate sponsor for naming rights to the school's basketball facility while also negotiating the first radio contract for St. Bonaventure women's basketball.

After a year-plus as the general manager for Oakland Sports Properties, Westerfield returned to athletic administration in January 2017 as the senior associate director of athletics for administration at Western Illinois where he was responsible for oversight of 10 of WIU's 19 sports programs.

He also was responsible for all broadcasting productions on ESPN3 and negotiated multiple-year partnerships with Pepsi/Gatorade and radio network affiliates before a one-year stint at Eastern Kentucky as its assistant director of athletics for development.

A 1997 graduate of Lindenwood University in political science, public administration and non-profit management and a 1999 Missouri State University master's of public administration graduate, Westerfield began his athletics administration career as an intern with the Shreveport Regional Sports Authority from August 1999-May 2000.



## Jason PUGH

Assistant AD for Media Relations

9TH YEAR AT NSU

Jason Pugh took the reins of the Northwestern State sports information office in May 2019 following the retirement of longtime assistant athletic director/sports information director Doug Ireland.

In eight-plus years at Northwestern State, Pugh has coordinated publicity for three baseball All-Americans — pitcher Adam Oller (2016 Collegiate Baseball; American Baseball Coaches Association), David Fry (2018 Collegiate Baseball) and Logan Hofmann (2020 Collegiate Baseball). He spearheaded efforts to ensure all NSU baseball games are available via streaming audio beginning in the 2017 season, broadcasting select home and road games solo or serving as the color commentator on Demon Sports Network coverage.

Pugh was part of the team that helped transition the NSU department to the ESPN+ platform, serving as both play-by-play and color analyst on Demon home baseball broadcasts while continuing to deliver radio streaming content for road games.

He served as the official scorer for the 2021 NCAA Ruston Regional hosted by Louisiana Tech.

During his 12-year tenure at The Times, Pugh was the Northwestern State football and men's basketball beat writer from 2010-2013 and covered the 2012-13 NSU team that captured the program's third NCAA Tournament berth.

While at The Times, Pugh covered the first three World Series that have taken place in Texas, one College World Series, one NCAA Men's Final Four and Super Bowl XLV. He has won first-place awards in Best Feature Story and Best Sports Story from the Louisiana Press Association and first place in Best Prep Feature from the Louisiana Sports Writers Association.

He also has captured numerous other awards for writing and design from the LSWA.

While a student at Louisiana-Lafayette, Pugh was the sports editor of the campus newspaper, The Vermilion, for two years and was a part of the sports information office for three years. In 2000-01, Pugh was the primary media contact for the inaugural season of Lady Cajuns soccer and for the nationally ranked Ragin' Cajuns baseball team, which made its lone College World Series appearance the previous year. He was the media relations contact for the 2001 Sun Belt Conference Baseball Tournament in Lafayette.

A 1997 graduate of Airline High School in Bossier City, Pugh was named the 2001 Louisiana-Lafayette Department of Communication Outstanding Graduate. He completed his master's in sport management from the Mark H. McCormack Department of Sport Management at the University of Massachusetts in May 2015.

Pugh is a member of College Sports Communicators, the Football Writers Association of America, the United States Basketball Writers Association and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association.



## Brad WELBORN

Assistant Sports Information Director

4TH YEAR AT NSU

After running the sports information show at Louisiana Christian University, Brad Welborn was promoted to assistant sports information director in June 2022.

Welborn began his Northwestern State tenure in July 2019 and is the primary contact for NSU volleyball, women's basketball and softball.

At Louisiana Christian, Welborn was responsible for the publicity and statistics for the school's 18 athletics programs.

He used his technical skills to implement live video streams for all Louisiana College home sporting events as well as a social media presence for the Wildcats on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. That included graphics and schedule posters as part of the publicity package.

A River Falls, Wisconsin, native, Zenk was a sports intern at the River Falls Journal in 2007, where he covered softball.

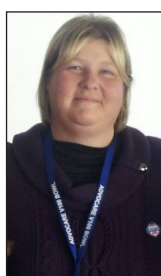

*The Department of Student Activities delivers programs, services and activities that provide entertainment, learning experiences, and opportunities for leadership and campus and community service-related activities. Student organizations, including an active Greek system of fraternities and sororities along with the Student Alumni Association and the Student Government Association, have constant involvement with NSU Athletics. The Demon Rewards program gives NSU students incentives, including cash and prizes, for attending NSU athletic events.*







# CHAMPS/ LIFE SKILLS

*The mission of the NCAA is to maintain intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the campus educational program and the student-athlete as an integral part of the student body. With this in mind, the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was created to support the student-athlete development initiatives of NCAA member institutions and to enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the context of higher education.*

*In the process of achieving this mission, the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program will:*

- Promote student-athletes' ownership of their academic, athletic, career, personal and community responsibilities.*
- Meet the changing needs of student-athletes.*
- Promote respect for diversity and inclusion among student-athletes.*
- Assist student-athletes in identifying and applying transferable skills.*
- Enhance partnerships between the NCAA, member institutions and their communities for the purpose of education.*
- Foster an environment that encourages student-athletes to effectively access campus resources.*
- Encourage the development of character, integrity and leadership skills.*

*Participating members in the CHAMPS/Life Skills Program are provided with sample materials and supplemental resources which support a student-athlete's development in five areas: academics, athletics, personal development, career development and community service.*

## *CHAMPS/Life Skills at NSU*

### PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOPS

The Personal Development piece is designed to cover many different subjects that student-athletes may not learn sitting in a classroom. Monthly workshops are held to teach student-athletes basic "life skills" that will be needed once they graduate. Some examples of areas which are covered include: personal finance, proper dining etiquette, personal nutrition, leadership, cooking tips, etc.

### CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Career Development is the cornerstone for the NSU CHAMPS program. Career Development opportunities are offered to all NSU student-athletes to assist them in preparing for life after college athletics. The staff is highly trained to provide services including: major and career assessments, résumé-writing, and mock interviewing - complete with video equipment for instant replay. All of these services are geared to specifically highlight the unique transferrable skills that student-athletes possess and to help ensure a successful transition to the professional world.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE

Community service is of high importance to NSU athletics. We believe that it is essential to give back to our community and teach the importance of being active citizens. NSU student-athletes totaled over 4,700 hours of community service in the 2010-11 academic year, bringing the total to nearly 10,000 hours in the last two years.

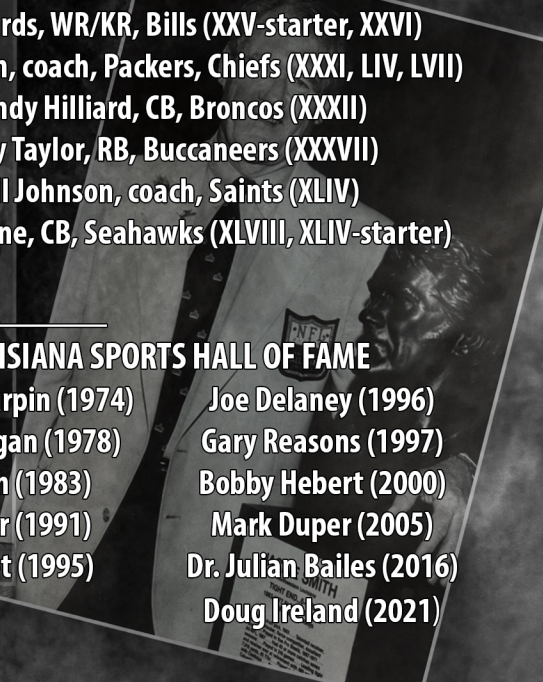
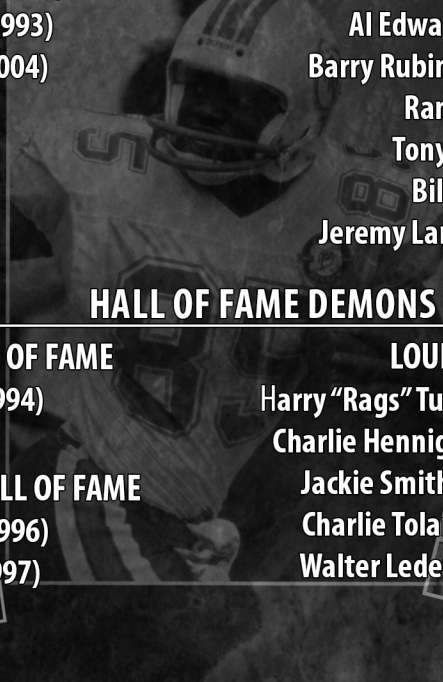
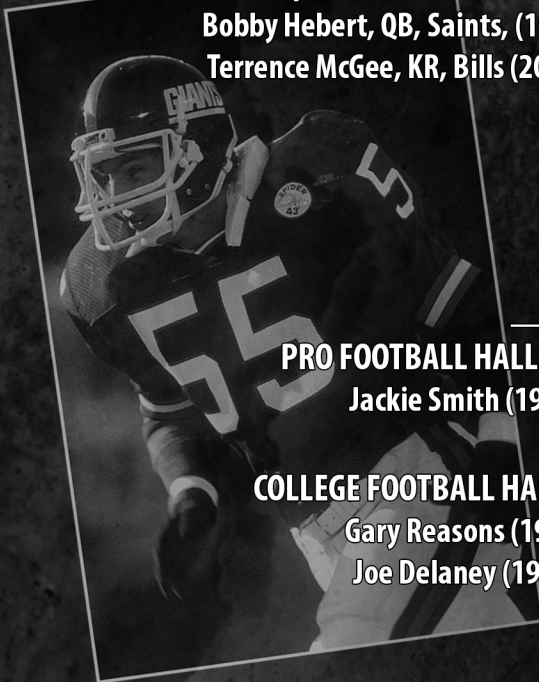
