2008 CROSS COUNTRY RECAP

The 2008 cross country season was one of the best in school history, as the SMU Mustangs finished 20th at the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championships at the LaVern Gibson Championship Cross Country Course in Terre Haute, Ind., braving the cold, windy and rainy conditions to earn their best finish in over a decade.

Sophomore Silje Fjørtoft led SMU, taking 40th in 20:51, while senior Rachael Forish clocked in at 20:56 for a 51st-place showing. Mustang freshmen Claire Hardwick (21:43) and Monika Korra (21:45) also scored well, finishing 133rd and 136th, respectively. Jessa Simmons (21:49) rounded out the SMU scorers in 144th, while Ilyssa Pettigrew (22:13/181st) and Sierra Anderson (23:35/212th) wrapped up their cross country careers with great races.

Also during the season, SMU won the first C-USA title for the cross country program and Fjørtoft won the individual title. SMU left little doubt in winning the title, with three Mustangs claiming top-10 finishes and all five scorers ranking in the top 12 of the 82-person race.

Fjortoft clocked a 5K course-record time of 16:46, while 2006 All-American Rachael Forish took sixth in 17:24. Freshman Monika Korra was 10th in 17:39, and Claire Hardwick (17:41) and Jessa Simmons (17:42) rounded out the SMU scorers in 11th and 12th, respectively. All seven SMU runners earned All-Conference accolades as Fjørtoft and Forish picked up first team merits, while Korra, Hardwick and earned second-team honors. Anderson and Pettigrew were honored with third-team merits.

It was a season dominated by Fjørtoft, as the Orsta, Norway, native was named Conference USA Cross Country Athlete of the Year after claiming C-USA individual medalist honors at the league championships. She was named to both the All-C-USA First Team and All-South Central Region Team. During the season, Fjørtoft had four top-six finishes in five regular-season races and was twice named the C-USA Athlete of the Week.

DAVE WOLLMAN

Director of Track & Field, Cross Country 22nd Season Indiana Central, '79

1992-93, 1995

Since beginning his tenure in 1988, head coach Dave Wollman has built one of the very best NCAA track and field programs in the country. During the decade between 1995-2005, no other program in the country posted the across-the-board success that SMU did - NCAA top-5 finishes in both men's and women's track and field along with representatives in the NCAA Cross Country Championships. Under Wollman's guidance, the Mustangs have won eight top-four NCAA championship trophies and returned to the top 20 in 2008, taking 19th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Since his arrival on the Hilltop, SMU student-athletes have earned nearly 200 All-America awards, and in the last eight years, his student-athletes have been honored as All-Americans 89 times. Wollman has also coached 34 NCAA Champions during his tenure – a number that very few coaches in NCAA history have attained. His athletes have broken seven NCAA collegiate records.

Wollman's reputation as a coach has attracted many premier performers to the SMU campus. Back in 1988, Wollman inherited a Mustang track and field

program that had very few returning letter winners. He immediately brought in an outstanding coaching staff, recruited several extremely talented athletes and built a closeness among team members. Wollman has been the architect of the SMU women's team, which was just a year old when he arrived in 1988.

As storied as Mustang track and field has been in the past, the exciting challenge of breaking new ground for SMU women's track and field lies ahead for Wollman. "The potential for the future is directly related to the level of passion of our student-athletes," Wollman said. "There's a famous quote: 'There are two kinds of people — people who want to fit in, and people who want to stand out.' We're looking for the student-athlete who has the courage, the focus and the passion needed to separate themselves from the pack.

"We now have elite athletes in numerous events, and look to continue the excellence and tradition that attracts top-level talent from all over the world. Athletes choose to come to SMU because of the combination of quality coaching and quality academics that it offers. I honestly believe that SMU is one of the greatest opportunities for a young person from anywhere in the world."

Wollman's status as an elite coach was reinforced at the 2000, 2004 and 2008 Olympic Games. He has coached multiple athletes at the Games, including Bronze Medalist Aleksander Tammert, finalists Libor Charfreitag and Hannes Hopley and Michael Robertson.

In addition, Wollman earned the title of "Master Coach" by the U.S. Track & Field Coaches Association - the highest level that a coach can achieve and an honor based on success. He was tabbed to serve as coach of the U.S. team at a competition in the off-season.

"I am extremely proud of every student-athlete, present and past," Wollman said. "We continue to have exceptional talent at SMU, but the most amazing ingredient in the makeup of these young people is their personal qualities. Their parents should be proud."

Wollman's peers have taken notice of his coaching expertise, as he has been selected to speak at a variety of clinics all over the world and was selected to serve as an assistant coach for the 1995 Junior Pan Am Games in Santiago, Chile. He was enshrined into the prestigious Mt. SAC Relays Hall of Fame in 2004 – an honor bestowed upon the only best coaches in the United States. In 2005, Wollman was honored in his home state when he was selected to the Indiana Track and Field Hall of Fame.

Wollman came to SMU after six years as an assistant at Stanford, where he coached two Olympians, four NCAA champions and 44 All-Americans.

Prior to Stanford, Wollman was an assistant at Purdue from 1981-82 and a teacher and coach at Concord High School in Elkhart, Ind., from 1979-81.

Wollman received a bachelor's degree in physical education and business education from Indiana Central University in Indianapolis in 1979, and was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame. He won the NCAA Division II shot put championship in 1977 and was runner-up the next two seasons. He also was a four-year starter at defensive end for the football team.


At Stanford, Wollman was very active in community relations. He and his wife, Shelley, were co-founders and directors of the Champs Foundation, the San Francisco 49ers' football camp for underprivileged children in the Bay area. Shelley was a member of the 49ers' public relations staff for six years before moving to Dallas.

Born in Highland Park, Mich., Wollman graduated from Wawasee High School in Syracuse, Ind.





COACHING STAFF



Cathy Casey is in her eighth season at SMU and fourth year as cross country coach/assistant track and field coach. On the track, Casey specializes in the development of middle and long distance athletes. During her tenure on the Hilltop, Casey has played a pivotal role in the Mustangs' swift rise to national prominence, including SMU's first-ever NCAA South Central Regional title and a pair of conference championships.

The 2008 cross country season was one of the best in program history. The Mustangs won their first Conference USA championship and finished 20th at the 2008 NCAA Championships. Casey was named C-USA Cross Country Coach of the Year, and helped Silje Fjørtoft earn Athlete of the Year honors. Fjørtoft and teammates Rachael Forish and Claire Hardwick earned NCAA All-South Central Region, and all seven Mustang runners earned All-Conference USA accolades. The team also earned USATFCCCA All Academic Honors for the fourth year in a row for their achievements in the classroom.

Under Casey's tutelage, Fjørtoft capped off her rookie campaign with a second-place finish in the 3,000-meter steeplechase at the NCAA Championships, garnering All-America and all-conference honors in the steeplechase and setting new SMU records in the steeplechase and the indoor mile, and all-conference honors in the 5000 meters. Pettigrew also ran the second-fastest 400 meters in SMU history and made her first appearance at the outdoor NCAA Championships in the 800 meters, earning all-conference and all-region honors in the event.

In 2007, Casev led Fjørtoft to a slew of honors. The freshman distance specialist was named the Conference USA Cross Country Newcomer of the Year, the NCAA South Central Region Athlete of the Year and C-USA Freshman of the Year. She clocked a winning 6K time of 20:35 at Regionals, 11 seconds ahead of the field. The two-time C-USA Athlete of the Week selection took runner-up honors at the C-USA Championships with a 5K time of 17:46.0. Fjørtoft capped off her rookie campaign with a second-place finish in the 3,000meter steeplechase at the NCAA Championships, garnering all-conference and All-America status in the steeplechase and setting new SMU records in the steeplechase and the indoor mile, and all-conference honors and a 49thplace finish in the 5K at the 2007 NCAA Championships. She was the third freshman to cross the finish line, clocking a time of 21:11.00 on the 5K course. During the 2007 indoor season, Casey tutored Ilyssa Pettigrew, who ran the second-fastest 800-meter run in school history, earned all-conference honors and qualified provisionally for the NCAA Championships. Under Casey's tutelage, Pettigrew also ran the second-fastest 400 meters in SMU history.

In 2006, Casey guided Rachael Forish to her first NCAA Outdoor appearance in which she ran a personal best time of 16:27.5. Forish was also named to the All-Midwest Region team in the 5000m. At the Conference USA Outdoor Championships, Forish, along with teammate Ilyssa Pettigrew earned individual All C-USA honors. During the indoor season, the distance medley relay team ran to a second place finish at the Conference Indoor Championships and two runners earned All-Conference USA honors. Forish made her way into the record books in the cross country season as she became the Mustangs' first-ever Conference USA Cross Country Conference Champion and C-USA Athlete of the Year. A few weeks later she raced her way to become the NCAA South Central Region Champion and was named NCAA South Central Region Athlete of the Year. After finishing 35th at the NCAA Cross Country Championships, she received All-America honors for her outstanding effort.

As a team, the Mustangs finished in the top five at the 2006 NCAA South Central Region Championships and in the top two at the 2006 Conference USA Cross Country Championships, with three runners receiving All-Conference USA honors.

During her first season as head cross country coach in 2005, Casey developed a talented group of athletes. Casey led the team to a top three finish at the Conference USA Cross Country Championships. Junior Jessie Jackson and Sophomore Rachael Forish earned All-Conference honors. Sophomore Rachael Forish was selected to the All-Region first team at with a seventh place finish at the NCAA South Central Region meet and qualified as an individual for the NCAA cross country championships.

During the 2002-2004 seasons, Casey assisted in the development of standout distance runner Karin van Rooyen, a two-time All-American, NCAA South Central Regional Champion, Western Athletic Conference (WAC) & SMU record holder, two-time WAC Athlete of the Year, and three-time WAC Champion. In the last six years at SMU, Casey has assisted with three WAC Freshmen of the Year, six All-Region cross country student-athletes, seven All-WAC performers and four school record holders.

A native of Carbondale, Ill., Cathy Casey was a member of the cross country/track and field team at the University of Texas. She currently resides in Dallas with her husband, Jim.



Tony Miller enters his third season as an assistant coach, responsible for the development of the Mustangs' sprint squad. Miller came to the Hilltop after having spent two years developing the University of North Texas 400M, 800M and 4x400M relay runners.

During his tenure at UNT, Coach Miller contributed to the women's first Indoor Sun Belt Conference Championship and a fifth-place finish on the men's side by leading nine athletes to indoor All-Conference honors in five events. The highlight of his outdoor campaign at UNT was the men's Sun Belt conference championship 4x400 meter relay, which ran the second fastest time in school history, placing fourth at the NCAA Midwest Regional meet, just missing a berth to the NCAA National meet. The women's 4x400 meter relay squad set a new school record and qualified for the NCAA Regional meet, where they placed 10th. Miller led a total of eight athletes to All-Conference honors in five events and several athletes to personal bests in their individual events.

Miller had a stellar collegiate track & field career with the Baylor Bears, competing in the 400 meters, 4x400 and 4x100 meter relays. In addition to three NCAA national titles in the 4x400 meter relay, Miller earned seven Southwest Conference Championship titles. A 15-time All-American, Miller still tops Baylor's list for highest number of combined All-America honors earned in the history of Baylor's track and field program. Miller was a member of the 1995 US Pan-American 4x400 relay team, competed in two US Olympic Trials and was a semi-finalist in the 400 meters at the 1996 trials.

A 1996 graduate of Baylor University, Miller earned his Bachelor of Business Administration in Marketing and is a USATF Level II Certified Coach.

Miller and his wife, Toinette, reside in Frisco, Texas, and have a son, Cameron and a daughter, Candace.
