

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

OUR PRESIDENT



DR. ROBERT M. GUILLOT President, Florence State University

Dr. Robert M. Guillot became Florence State University's 10th president last April 1 and in this short period of his administration he has earned the respect and admiration of students, faculty and the citizenry of the Shoals area for his optimistic and enthusiastic approach to the responsibilities of his office.

Dr. Guillot's versatile and progressive background enables him to lead the university in a business like manner and his personality and devotion to duty have created a pleasant campus atmosphere. Despite his demanding schedule, Dr. Guillot finds time for informal discussions with students and often takes coffee breaks with them in the cafeteria of the Student Union Building.

He accepted the presidency with but one goal in mind, that of moving Florence State University forward. Dr. Guillot's aim is to develop the university into a major educational institution and while maintaining the highest degree in academics, he is anxious to gain more recognition for the school through its athletic endeavors.

A native of Headland, Ala., Dr. Guillot graduated from Dothan High School and Livingston University. He received his BS degree from Auburn, his Juris Doctor degree from Alabama and his Chartered Life Underwriter degree from the American College of Life Underwriters.

Dr. Guillot is a Mason and Shriner, President of the Alabama League of Municipalities and the Association of Alabama Life Insurance Companies. He recently completed his third term as mayor of Vestavia Hills and is a member of Vestavia Hills Baptist Church.

He is listed in "Who's Who in Alabama, Commerce and Industry, the South and Southwest, 1971, and Who's Who in Insurance."

Dr. Guillot is married to the former Patty Shirley of Reform and they have three children, Patti Ann, a senior at Alabama; Bobby, a freshman at Alabama; and Shirley Lynne, a high school sophomore.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF FLORENCE STATE

Florence State University, situated in the picturesque Tennessee River Valley, is the oldest existing state-supported teacher educating institution south of the Ohio.

The university occupies a campus of 80 acres in a residential section of Florence in the Muscle Shoals area of North Alabama. Florence has a population of almost 40,000, and with the towns of Sheffield, Tuscumbia and Muscle Shoals City immediately adjacent, is a part of an urban center with a population in excess of 85,000.

The Shoals is a rich agricultural section in the heart of TVA. Power, navigation, and recreation development have also made it one of the most rapidly expanding industrial regions in the South.

The rivers, lakes, and camping sites attract sportsmen and vacationists from all over the nation.

Florence State traces its origins to LaGrange College, which was established in 1830 at LaGrange, Ala., by the Methodist Church on the first college charter to be issued by the new State of Alabama.

In 1854, the president of the school, seeking to reestablish the institution on firmer footing, led most of the faculty and student body to temporary facilities in Florence, and for a few months the name LaGrange College was borne by two schools only a few miles apart.

The original LaGrange College remained in existence until its physical facilities were destroyed by federal troops in 1863. The school at Florence was required to secure a new charter and in 1855 it was incorporated as Wesleyan University. Wesleyan Hall, erected in this period with the financial assistance of the citizens of Florence, still provides classrooms and office facilities after more than a century of education service.

With the ourtbreak of the Civil War, the departure of faculty and students closed the doors of Wesleyan University except to the southern and northern forces alternately finding shelter there.

In 1872, the school was established as a State Normal School, the first of its kind in the South. The admission of women students two years later placed the school among the first co-educational institutions in the U.S.

In 1929, the school became a State Teachers College. By action of the new Board of Trustees the name was changed to Florence State University effective Sept. 1, 1968 — an action portending the continued expansion of the school's programs and purposes in its educational service to the State.

FOOTBALL AT FSU





Florence State University was known as State Normal School when it fielded its first football team in 1912. Only one regular game was played that year with Sewanee racing to a 101-0 win.

Football was played off and on, a game here and a game there, until 1927 when State Normal scheduled seven opponents. It defeated the Howard College (now Samford University) reserves in the opener and six consecutive setbacks followed.

Only two contests were slated in 1928 with Murray State and Marion Institute coasting to easy victories. The sport was then dissolved and wasn't revived until two decades later.

The school was now Florence State Teacher's College and Dr. E. B. Norton, who had taken the reins of the presidency in 1948, called a student assembly on March 30, 1949, to announce that football, upon the recommendation of the athletic committee, would be renewed.

The committee which made this monumental decision was composed of H. A. Flowers, athletic director, H. H. Floyd, Otis Peacock, Charles A. Glock and R. C. Fuller.

Florence State first participated in the Alabama Collegiate Football Conference with Troy, Jacksonville and Livingston from 1961-69. In 1970 Tennessee-Martin and Delta State joined the Alabama schools to form the short-lived Mid-South Conference.

Southeastern Louisiana and Nicholls State were added last season and the eight teams played under the banner of the Gulf South Conference.

The Gulf South has the potential to become one of the strongest small college leagues in the nation and will launch the 1972 campaign as a 10-team conference. During a GSC meeting in New Orleans this past summer, Northwestern Louisiana and Mississippi College were admitted by a vote of the presidents.

Florence State is an affiliate of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

All FSU football records begin with the renewal of the sport in 1949. Going into the 1972 season, the Lions have played 219 games, winning 115, losing 96 and tying eight.



HENRY H. "HAL" SELF

Athletic Director

Hal Self, a native of Decatur, is in his 24th year of service to Florence State University athletics.

He came to Florence from Athens High to restore football after a 20-year absence and stepped down as head coach following the 1969 campaign to devote all of his time to the responsibilities of athletic director. He had assumed that position upon the retirement of H. A. Flowers during the summer of 1969.

Self was at the helm of FSU football for 21 seasons and led the Lions in 198 games, winning 109, losing 81 and tying eight.

He concluded an outstanding coaching career at Florence State, notching his 13th successful season in 1969 against only six losing years and two break-even.

After starring at Decatur High under the legendary Shorty Ogle, Self signed with Alabama and quarterbacked the Crimson Tide from Coach Frank Thomas' powerful single wing attack.

He sparked Alabama to a perfect 9-0 mark in 1945 as the Tide established an all-time record for most points (396) and most touchdowns (58). Self scored two touchdowns as 'Bama bombed Southern Cal 34-14 in the 1946 Rose Bowl.

A gifted athlete, Self won the coveted Jacobs Trophy in 1945, an award given annually to the best blocker in the Southeastern Conference.

Self, an honor student who received his BS and master's degree from Alabama, launched his career as head coach at Athens in 1946. He established a fantastic prep record in three years, posting two 9-1 seasons. He was selected to coach the North in the annual High School All-Star game in 1948.

Self's first Florence State team surprised most observers by posting a 4-5 record and the Lions marched to eight straight winning seasons.

He is married to the former Shirley Williams of Decatur and they are the parents of two sons, Hank, 21, and Gil, 9, and a daughter, Sue, 19.

DURELL MOCK

Head Football

Coach

Elevated to the top post in December, 1969, Durell Mock is entering his third season as leader of the Florence State University Lions. His first team battled to a 5-5 finish and last year's edition, swamped by misfortune, slumped to 1-10. Florence State dropped two games by one point each and two more by only a touchdown.

Hardly a stranger to the Tennessee Valley, Mock, born in Talladega on November 10, 1929, played on FSU's first team under Hal Self.

Respected as a fierce and enduring competitor, Mock starred at offensive guard and linebacker after playing fullback at Talladega High. He broke into the lineup as a freshman against Jacksonville and started the next 35 games in succession. Mock teamed with Harlon Hill, now a Lion assistant, to captain the 1952 squad which fashioned an 8-1 record. Mock was voted "Most Valuable Lineman" that year.

FSU's head coach served a two-year Army hitch and played one season at Ft. Jackson, S. C. He was Athletic NCO the second year with Uncle Sam at Ft. McPherson, Ga.

Mock's initial coaching job in 1956 at Guin found him heading up three sports - football, basketball and baseball. He became line coach at Deshler in 1959 and was named to the North staff for the annual High School All-Star game at Tuscaloosa in 1960.

He became Muscle Shoals' first head football coach and athletic director in 1961 and served in those capacities until 1967 when he joined the FSU staff to tutor the defensive line.

Mock, who is 5-11 and weighs 215 pounds, is a member of Highland Baptist Church where he is superintendent of young adult Sunday School classes. His favorite hobbies are camping and horseback riding with his family. He is married to the former Ruth Henson of Florence and they are the parents of two boys, Danny, 16, and Bill, 10.

HARLON HILL joined Florence State staff in June from



Brooks Elementary School at Killen where he served as principal.

1972 LION PREVIEW

The greatest task confronting Coach Durell Mock and his staff this fall is instilling a winning attitude in the face of last year's frustrating season.

However, Mock saw signs of encouragement during the spring and with 25 lettermen returning, including 17 players who logged starting time in 1971, the outlook has taken on an optimistic air.

The minus factor going into the first game with Middle Tennessee is a lack of depth.

"We simply do not have adequate back-up strength at this time," Mock said, "and if we receive injuries to key personnel, we could be in real trouble. Of course, it remains to be seen how quickly we can expect help from our newcomers and returnees from last year's squad who did not play to any extent. We always hope for those so-called pleasant surprises and if some of our youngsters pan out in time, we could be stronger than anticipated."

Florence State will turn to six seniors for the nucleus of its leadership this year and all are experienced performers. They are quarterback Randy Elmore, tight end Leroy Baker, flankers Jim Trimble and Bobby Burcham, defensive tackle Frankie Patterson, and linebacker William McMormack. Baker, Trimble, Patterson and McCormack are three-year lettermen while Elmore and Burcham own two monograms.

THE OFFENSE

Randy Elmore is a proven field general, having paced the Gulf South Conference in passing and total offense last year. However, scoring is the name of the game and the Lions bogged down on several different occasions, resulting in narrow defeats.

Fullback Mike Wilburn, a junior, emerged as one of the top rushers in the league in '71 and if he can gain some support, the Lions should be able to generate a scoring punch.

Another junior, Larry Brom, appears to be a front-runner at tailback. Also a consistent punter, Brom dropped from 215 pounds to 185 in the off-season program and has picked up some speed.

Tony McMinn, a defensive back last year, and newcomers Jim Satterfield, Jerry Mizell and Scotty King will get a chance to contribute. David Elmore is a letterman at quarterback and several new faces will also be making a bid for playing time.

The Lions boast two of the prime receivers in the conference in Danny Kimble and Trimble and Baker, injured during the spring, is making a transition from defensive end to tight end.

Lettermen in the interior line are tackles Wendell Hathorn and Mike Nave, guard Bill Morton and center Paul Parvin.

THE DEFENSE

Patterson, All-Gulf South Conference last season, and McCormack are the most experienced headhunters but several have come under fire and should be ready to go.

Larry Brown, one of the leading ball hounders on the team last season, will team with Patterson at the tackles. Billy Hargrove is a returning starter at defensive end while Bill Strain, a center in '71, has been shifted to end and could become a terrrific addition.

David Harbin lettered with the offense last year but will play defensive guard this round. John Trotter, who reported to fall practice in '71 injured, missed most of the campaign but is healthy now and has the ability.

Other defensive lettermen are linebackers Hezzie Morgan and Doyce Steele, and defensive backs Jim Witt, David Hines and Larry Jeffreys.

Newcomers such as Tim Tortorice, Terry Buchanan, Spry Mitchell, Jim Ezell, Ivan Richard and Frankie Williams stand ready. Tortorice, Buchanan and Mitchell are junior college transfers and should be ahead of the high school signees.*

Punting and place kicking were more than adequate last year and should be much stronger in 1972.

Dale Mathis challenged Brom for punting chores near the end of the season, giving the Lions two excellent kickers.

McCormack has missed only three extra points in the last two years and he has improved his field goal range and accuracy.



BOBBY BURCHAM, Senior FL, 6-0, 175, 22, 2 Letters, Russellville, Ala. Runs best pattern of any wide receiver — Overcomes lack of speed with determination and hustle — Played for Russellville's two-time 3A State champs, 1967-68.

AL CARTER, Freshman DT, 6-2, 250, 19, 0 Letters, Athens, Ala. Big and strong — Needs to become more agressive — Held out last year — Could add much-needed depth to defensive line.

DAVID ELMORE, Sophomore QB, 6-1, 185, 21, 1 Letter, Bessemer, Ala. Came under fire early last year when starting quarterback was injured — Opened in Samford game, did creditable job — Ran six times for 40 yards — Will apply pressure for No. 1 job.

RANDY ELMORE, Senior QB, 6-1, 185, 21, 2 Letters, Florence, Ala. Leading passer and total offense king last year in Gulf South Conference — Hit on 105 of 217 aerials for 1,527 yards — Rushed for 199 yards on 140 attempts, upping offense to 1,728 yards — Holds GSC record for most completions in one game (17 against Troy, 1971) — Shares school mark with Don Cornelius (21 against Jacksonville, 1970) — 87-yarder to Bobby Joe Pride last year in 31-30 loss to Arkansas Tech is longest pass play in FSU history — Father Joe starred as Lion quarterback, was former FSU assistant coach — Married and father of one-year-old son.



REVIEWING THE 1971 SEASON

FSU 24, MIDDLE TENNESSEE 14

Although Florence State managed but one victory last year, it was a "biggie". The Lions, fired up from the opening whistle, scored first then overcame a halftime touchdown deficit early in the third quarter to drop

Middle Tennessee 24-14 in the home opener.

"Rabbit" Thomas bolted 35 yards for a first-period marker but the Blue Raiders tallied twice before intermission for a 14-7 edge. Randy Elmore lofted a 58-yard scoring strike to Bobby Joe Pride with only seconds gone in the third frame and later in the same quarter Elmore cracked over from the two. William McCormack added the icing by toeing an 18-yard field goal in the final stanza.

Mike Wilburn paced Lion runners with 96 yards in 18 carries.

FSU 13, STATE COLLEGE OF ARKANSAS 14

On a rainy and dismal night in Conway, Ark., Florence State registered 155 yards in penalties, two of which resulted in touchdowns called back, and subsequently

lost a 14-13 heartbreaker to State College.

The Lions drove 60 yards after taking the opening kickoff only to have Randy Elmore's 14-yard touchdown scamper nullified. State College punched into a 14-7 half-time lead but the Lions closed the gap in the third quarter when Elmore scooted over from the four. William Mc-Cormack's PAT try was partially blocked and the score held 14-13. In the fourth quarter, Bobby Joe Pride raced 56-yards for an apparent go-ahead TD, but again it was erased by penalty. The Lions made a final last-ditch drive to victory, but a field goal attempt failed with 13 seconds remaining.

FSU 10, DELTA STATE 17

The Delta State jinx resumed in Florence as Mike Sumrall streaked 11 yards with only 19 seconds left in the game to give the Statesmen a hair-raising 17-10 triumph.

William McCormack's 20-yard field goal in the first period gave the Lions a 3-0 edge at the half. The Statesmen surged out front 7-3 in the third but Randy Elmore's one-yard plung placed FSU back in the driver's seat

DSC tied matters on a field goal midway of the fourth quarter and with time running out, the Statesmen controlled a punt and drove it in for the win.

FSU 7, SAMFORD 28

Enroute to one of their best season's ever, Samford's bowl-bound Bulldogs caught Florence flat at Russellville High Stadium, charged into a 10-0 lead and coasted to a 28-7 romp.

The Lions' lone touchdown came in the second quarter after freshman Doyce Steele recovered a Bulldog fumble at the SU 17. Randy Elmore sifted in from the two.

However, Samford added another TD and a two-point conversion in the third quarter to ice the game away. The last period was scoreless.

FSU 30, ARKANSAS TECH 31

Florence State's homecoming battle with another bowlbound outfit heaped more frustration on the youthful Lions. FSU controlled the game at halftime 20-10 but with 4:24 left, Arkansas tallied to trim the Lion lead to 30-24.

As Florence faithful looked on in almost disbelief, Tech's Bill Breedlove darted 12 yards for the final Wonder Boy touchdown and with 2:12 left, Craig Williams kicked the PAT for a 31-30 victory.

One of FSU's touchdowns was a record-breaking 87yard bomb from Randy Elmore to Bobby Joe Pride.

FSU 7, HENDERSON STATE 21

The Lions rolled up almost 400 yards of total offense to less than 200 for Henderson State, but the Reddies' defense held when it had to and Florence bowed 21-7 in Arkadelphia.

Time and again, the Lions moved to within the shadows of Henderson's goal but could penetrate it only once. Mike Wilburn, who gained 116 yards on 27 carries, waltzed nine yards late in the first quarter and FSU trailed just 14-7.

However, the Reddies scored again early in the second period and the 21-7 halftime count was good

for the game.

FSU 14, TROY STATE 21

Troy's Mike Culbertson hauled in a short pass on the Red Wave's first play from scrimmage and turned it into a 60-yard touchdown but Florence charged back and made a fight of it all the way before bowing out 21-14 at Troy.

William McCormack kicked 18 and 43-yard field goals in the first half and the Lions trailed 14-6 going into the third quarter. Troy mustered another TD punch in the third for a 21-6 command. Mike Wilburn brought the Lions back with a three-yard tally late in the game and Randy Elmore targeted Jim Trimble for a two-point conversion leaving it 21-14. Elmore completed 17 passes to establish a Gulf South Conference record.

FSU 0, LIVINGSTON 31

Livingston's Tigers, the third bowl team Florence met last season, inflicted the first shutout on a Lion squad in 30 straight games. The Tigers, who nipped Arkansas Tech 14-12 for the NAIA championship, led 10-0 at intermission and scored three touchdowns in the last half for the 31-0 whitewash in Florence.

The highlight of the contest was a 100-yard return of an intercepted pass by Nels Strickland in the fourth quarter after Florence had driven to the Tiger three.

FSU 6, APPALACHIAN STATE 59

William McCormack kicked field goals of 38 and 32

yards the first two times Florence State had the football against Appalachian in Boone, N. C., but it apparently only made the Mountaineers mad. They reeled off five touchdowns in the first half for a 35-6 lead and added three more in the last quarter for good measure.

The Lions fumbled four times and had one pass intercepted. Appalachian, meanwhile amassed 537 yards of total offense in the first meeting between the two schools.

FSU 7, TENNESSEE-MARTIN 20

Tennessee-Martin blitzed Florence State for 17 points in less than two minutes just prior to intermission and went on to a 20-7 victory at Martin.

Trailing 20-0 in the third quarer, the Lions managed their only counter when Randy Elmore plowed over from the two.

Mike Wilburn was the leading rusher in the game with 88 yards on 24 carries.

FSU 7, JACKSONVILLE STATE 60

"Rabbit" Thomas sped 13 yards for the game's first touchdown but unfortunately it was also the Lion's last as Jacksonville steamrolled to a lepsided 60-7 win.

Led by sophomore sensation Boyce Callahan, the Gamecocks logged 601 yards of total offense while holding the Lions to 203.

The game was played at Birmingham's Legion Field and sponsored by the Birmingham Kiwanis Club.



WILLIAM "BRUB" HAMILTON

Pound for pound, "Brub" Hamilton was one of the greatest backs ever to play for Florence State.

The Athens flash stood only 5-8 and weighed just 155, but lack of size was never a deterrent when it came to running, passing or kicking the football.

In 1955, "Brub" carried the leather 168 times and responded with 761 yards and six touchdowns. He led the Lions in passing, completing 47 of 105 attempts for 608 yards. His total offense of 1,369 yards ranked him third in the nation among small colleges.

"Brub" was named to the Associated Press All-American Team in 1955.

PAUL WENDELL "WINDY" TAYLOR

A native of Bridgeport, "Windy" erased most of the memories of the greats before him when he shattered school records for rushing and scoring in 1954. He carried the ball 166 times for 964 yards and tallied 13 touchdowns for 78 points.

In 1955, he cracked his own record for rushing, picking up 1,021 yards on 196 carries. Again, he paced the Lions in scoring by racing for eight touchdowns and kicking 12 of 15 extra point attempts for 60 points.

"Windy" was named to the NAIA-Helms Foundation All-American Team in 1955.

GEORGE "RICKY" LINDSEY

A starting flanker for three seasons (1966-68), Ricky Lindsey erased all but two receiving records and he shares those.

He tied Earnest Breland's mark for most passes caught in one game (10) in 1966 and the same year he came into a deadlock with Marvin Clem for most touchdown passes snared in a season (6).

Ricky, who starred at Sheffield High, owns several game and season records and a trio of career highs. The career highs are for most passes caught (149), most yards pass receiving (1,611) and most touchdown passes caught (12).


DON CORNELIUS

Although Florence State could manage but a dozen victories during the four years Don Cornelius quarter-backed the team (1964-67), he established an impressive record and owns a majority of Lion game, season and career marks.

Cornelius, who came to FSU from Lee of Huntsville, broke into the starting lineup early in the 1964 season after Doyle Hill was injured.

He holds career records for most points (206), most touchdowns rushing (33), most passes attempted (637), most passes completed (332), most yards passing (4,309), most touchdown passes thrown (22), most passes had intercepted (42), and most total offense (5,226 yards).

HELMS HALL OF FAME



1950 - 1953

The Chicago Bears of the National Football League had won only three games in 1953 and some of the downfall was attributed to the lack of stellar receiving.

So, the search was on and the Bears sent the late Clark Shaughnessy, who was a noted exponent of the T-formation, to Montgomery in January 1954, to survey the talent in the annual Blue-Gray Game.

"The best end in this part of the country wasn't chosen to play in this game," the Bear coach was told. "If you want to latch on to a good one, check on a Hill boy up at Florence State Teachers."

Chicago waited until the 15th round of the draft to select Harlon Hill. The Bears figured the delay was safe since they knew little about him and none of the other teams had heard of him at all.

As a senior at FSU in 1953, he had caught only 12 passes for 246 yards and four touchdowns to pace the Lions in receiving. But on the afternoon of October 31, 1954 in San Francisco, Hill snared seven passes from Bear quarterback George Blanda for 263 yards and four touchdowns. The payoff strikes were for 47, 21, 11 and 66 yards and the Bearrs defeated the 49ers in a 31-27 thriller. The clincher was the 66-yard bomb in the final 33 seconds.

Harlon helped the Bears to 11 victories and was named "Rookie of the Year." In 1955, during his second pro campaign, NFL competitors voted him the first recipient of the Jim Thorpe Trophy, awarded annually to the "Most Valuable Player."

He was named All-League in 1954-55-56 and played for the West in the Pro-Bowl Game in 1955-56-57. The West won all three games, 26-19, 31-30 and 19-10. Harlon captained the 1956 squad.

Harlon held the all-time Bear record for passes caught (226) and yardage gained (4,616). He also shared the club record of four touchdowns in a single game with Rick Casares and Willie Galimore. He caught 40 touchdown passes in his glory-packed years at Chicago, the longest being an 88-yard TD reception.

In 1956 Harlon was honored by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics by being voted into the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame for his contributions to small college football.
