Good Morning

I would like to first of all welcome all our guests to Namibia, but it particular to our capital City, Windhoek. Secondly, I wish to welcome all the participants to this National Workshop on Namibia's accession process to the Convention on the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes.

Let me at the outset thank the Water Convention Secretariat for the continuous support that it rendered to our Ministry for this process and I look forward to the conclusion and thus Namibia's accession to the Water Convention.

Furthermore, allow me to appreciate the Water Convention parties for opening up the Convention to accommodate the accession of other UN Member States outside Europe. Namibia sees a great opportunity to be part of this global legal framework because all our perennial rivers are transboundary and shared with neighbouring countries. In our view therefore being part of this Convention will add value to the implementation of the existing bilateral and multilateral Agreements, as well as protocols and conventions aimed at promoting joint management and sustainable development of the internationally shared waters. In addition, parties to the water convention stand to benefit from Namibia's long standing experience on transboundary water cooperation.

Ladies and Gentlemen;

In today's interconnected world, water availability is directly related to peace and security. World-wide, pressure on freshwater is rising with climate change, pollution and growing demand for water further contributing to water insecurity.

Transboundary water cooperation is one of the mechanisms aimed at ensuring that water is not a source of conflict, but a symbol of partnership, joint progress and economic development. It is precisely for this reason that Namibia expressed interest to be part of the Water Convention, during the 9th Meeting of the Parties to the Water Convention held in September 2021, in Geneva, Switzerland. We have no doubt that by acceding to the Water Convection, Namibia will strengthen her capacity and add additional tools in catalysing change towards water and peace nexus. Furthermore, Namibia also envisions to gain new insights for enhanced transboundary cooperation, conflict prevention and regional stability. We, therefore, call on our national, regional and global stakeholders for their support in making Namibia's accession to the Water Convention a reality.

Namibia's undertaking to the Convention has become more and more important as Water Diplomacy is increasingly becoming a corner stone for transboundary water management, not only to avoid harm to others but also to benefit each other. Through water diplomacy, riparian states can realize the benefits of cooperating on management of water resources through joint planning, development and policy harmonization. Water, when is equitably shared, can become a confidence and trust building measure between nations and people.
