Neonatal unit has provided vital support for little Erin

A MALPAS mum is backing the Countess of Chester Hospital's Babygrow Appeal after the help given to her daughter at their neonatal unit.

Little Erin Jones was born to mum Gaynor and dad Carl prematurely in November last year at just 28 weeks, leaving her requiring ongoing medical attention for the first months of her life.

Erin was on a ventilator to help her breathe for the first four weeks, being transferred to Alder Hey Children's Hospital in Liverpool to have an operation on her heart valve before returning to the Countess' neonatal unit, where she

remained until she was able to go home for the first time on

Wednesday, March 20, weighing 5lbs 14oz. Gaynor said "It was a very traumatic pregnancy from fairly early on. I had been told that my baby had a one in 15 chance of being a Down's baby, then at a scan I had at 19 weeks I was advised that the baby was very small and not growing as expected.

"I underwent all sorts of tests including one for dwarfism and another for cystic fibrosis but everything came back negative"

negative".
Gaynor had a Doppler scan, a form of ultrasound scan which measures if the placenta is working normally.
"The scan traces blood

"The scan traces blood flow between the placenta and the baby through the umbilical cord. If the baby is not getting enough blood, it may be that the baby is not getting enough nutrients or oxygen which is one of the reasons it can be very small.

"Those first few days and weeks were touch and go."

Erin was transferred back to the Countess Neonatal Unit where she was still oxygen dependant and expected to remain so for several more months.

By the beginning of March her weight had reached 5lb 5oz and Erin's big sister Gabby, eight, loves to visit at the weekend and helps her mum to bath Erin.

When asked about how she thought the Babygrow would be of benefit to future mums Gaynor said: "The extra space would be really welcome. I am breast feeding and to do this and express milk would be much easier if there was more privacy.

"Gabby would also benefit greatly from being able play in a designated area to relieve the boredom of spending long periods in the hospital. I hope a lot of people and local companies will think of ways that they can get involved and support this appeal."

The Countess in partnership with the Chester Standard has launched an appeal to raise £3million in three years to create a new neonatal unit.
